

**A description of England, as it was deuided  
in the Saxones time into vij. kingdomes.**



**The entring and raigning of the Saxons.**

This was the commynge in ffirst of the Angles or Saxones into this realme, being yet unchristened and infidels: which was about the yeare of our Lord, as William Malmesbury testifieth, L.C.C.L. ixix, the Captaines of whō were Hengistus and Horsus. Although the sayd Hengist and Saxones at their first commynge, for all their subtle wroking and cruell attempt, had no quiet settynge in Britayne, but were driven out divers tymes by the valiantnesse of Aurelius Ambrosius, and his brother Vter above mentioned, who raigne after that among the Britanes: yet notwithstanding they were not so driven out, but that they returned againe, and at length possessed all, drivynge the Britanes (such as remained) into Cambria, whiche we call nowa dayes, Hengistus, as some Chronicles recorde, reigned 43 years, and died in Kent. Galfridus in suo Britanico, sayeth, that he was taken in warre by Aurelius Ambrosius, and beheaded at Corningelburgh, after he had raigne 43 years.

After the death of Hengist, hys sonne Osea, raigne xxiiij. yeres leauing his sonne Octa, to whose reigne with hys sonne Ymericuſ, hys soies due attriue iiii. yeres,

who also were slaine at length by Vter Pendragon, Polichro. Ex. Pollicro. n. Lib. 5. cap. 4.

The Saxones after they were settled in the possession of England, distributed the Realme among themselves, ffirst in seven parties: every party to haue his king, that is: The first to be king of Kent. The second to be king of Sussex and Southerey, holding hys Palace at Leicester. The thirde king was of westere. The fourth king of Elſer. The fift king was of the Eastangles, that is, of Cambridgeshire, Northfolke, and Southfolke. The vi. king of Merceland, of Mercia, and in his Kingdome were conteyned the Countees of Lincole, Leyceſter, Hantngdon, Northampton, Oxford, Darby, Warwike, &c. The vii. king had all the countries beyond Humber, and was calld king of Northumberland.

Of these seven kingdomes, althouḡ they conuinued not long, but at length ioyned all in one, commynge all into the possession & subdiction of the West Saxons: yet for the space they continued (which was in continuall trouble & warres among themselves) this is the race and order of them, as in this Table particularly followeth to be seene.
