This Sigebertus Paruus with his brother Sebertus were flayne of Kynegilfus and Swithelinus his brother, by the infi indgement of Bod, for they renolted agains from their Fanth, and expelled Mellitus Bilhop of London.

This Segebertus Bonus 02 Sibertus much resorting to Oswy, king of Pozthumberland, by his perswation was 14 brought to Christia daptifine, baptifed of Finianus Bilh. to who also was lent Cedde with other ministers to preache to baptile in hys countrey. At last he was flaine of his me about him, vling to much to space his enemics, a to for gene their infuries that repented. Flor.

This Sigherius and Sebbi first fell to Idolatry, then through the meanes of Wolferus King of Mercia, were reduwardus, which was ced, at laft Sebby became a Monte.

Offaafter hee had raigned a while, Selredus, of Colredus, became a Monke at Rome.

The Swithredus was subdued buto Egbert Ring of westlarous. Albeit London remained buder the Wercias to the time that they also were subdited to the welklarous. This kingdom began, An. 561, and so continued till the time of Egbertus. Some Stories say it continued to the time of Edward some of Aluredus, about the coming of the Danes, and contained under it the Lordship of Midlese and London. The Mestropolitane sea of this promines of Esse was London, where the famous Church of S. This Ethelredus for bys holinette & 26 godly vertues is counted for a Saint, be innocently comming to Offa kying Ethelredus, flaine. 52 of Wercia to marrie worth Althrid hys Daughter, by the finisher suspicion of Offa, and wicked countaile of kineswing his wife, was cruelly put to death in p 5 house of Offa. For the which cause Offa afterward repenting went to Rome, where he made him leste a Monte.

Cafter this linfull murther of Ethelbert, the kingdome of Castangles during the time of certaine yeares, was in great trouble and desolation, buder divers kings and tyrants, sometime the king of welflare, somtimes of Bent, or of edercia, haning dominion ouer them, till the comming of S. Edmund, whych was the last Iking there ruling under the welflarons.

Cafter the death of S. Edmund, being flaine of the Infive Danes, the kingdom remained with the Danes. 50. yeares, till at length Edward King of the Welflarons, era gan about the yere of our Lozd, 561, and continued neare about 377, yeares, Fabian numbeeth but 12, kinges, but in other I finde moc.

Although the milerable Britaines thus were berined of their land, by the cruel subtilty of the Sarons, yet were they not so drive out or expulsed, but that a certaine kingbom remained amog them, in some part of the lad, name ly about Cornewall, and the partes of Cambria, which is benided in two partes, Southwales, called Demetia, and fourthwales called Venedocia. The layd Britaines moreour through the valuant acres of their kings, sometimes raigned also in other countreis, displacing the Sarons, a reconcring agains their owner someone more, somtimes lesse, till the time of Carecius, when as the Britaines being beposed by Godmundus, (whose help they themselves sent for our of Irelande, against Carecius they, wicked King) beterly lost their land and kingdome: being evence winen pitterly into wales and Comewale, the pere of our Loide 570. What the order of these kings was, what were they? actes, their names, and times when they raigned: in this briefe table under wrytten is expressed, wherein first is to be premonified that Constantinus secundus had three chil-Die, to wit, Constans, whych was made a Monte in witchefter, and after made a hing : the feconde was Aurelius Ambrofius: the thirde was V ter Pendragon.
