Werburga was the daughter of Vlferus king of Mercians, & made Junne at Bly. Kinreda lister of king V lferus and Kinswida her lister, were both Aumnes profested. Sexburga daughter of kyng Anna king of Wercians, and wyse of Ercombert kyng of Rent, was Abbelle at Bly. Elfridadaughter of Ofwy kyng of Routhumberland, was Abbelle of whitney. Mildreda, Milburga, and Milguida, all three daughters of Merwaldus king of well edercians, entred the profession and bow of Munith virginitie. Kineburga, wife of Alfride king of Mozethumberland, and lifter to Officus king of Mercians, and daughter of king Penda, was professed Abbelle of the Monaffery in Blocefter. Elfleda, daughter of Ofry king, and wyfe of Peda, some of king Penda, likewife inclosed her self in the lame profession and vow of Bromish chastitie. Like= wife Alfritha wyfe to king Edgar. And Editha Daughter to the fayd Edgar, with Wolfrich her mother, &c. 

By these historyes it is apparaunt: what mutations. what perturbations, and what alteració of flate hath bene in this Realine of Britayne, first from Brittaynes kings, to ikomaines, then to Britannes agayn, afterward to the Sarons. First to bij. altogether raigning, then to one. ac. And this alteration of onely happened in privile govern= ment, but also followed in the flate Ecclefialtical. For as in the Bzitaynes tyme the Metropolitanica was in Londo: fo in the Sarous time after the comming of Aulten, it was remoued to Caterbury, the Catologue and order of which egetropolitanes, from the tyme of Austen to Egbertus, is thus, as in the history of Malmel beriensis described.

In his rymeking Offa tran= flated the egetropolitane leafrom Caunterbury to Lichfield by the graunt of Pope Adrian, beyng o= uercome with Apostolicall argu= ments, as layth Flores Hist that is with money.

This Ethelardus by his Epi= files to Pope Leo, obtained the Metropolitane lea agayne to La-

terbury.

Duryng the course of these 17. Archbishops of Cant. in Rome patted in the meane tyme 34. Popes, of whome partly heretofore we have declared.

And thus much touching the tyme of the leven kings bomes of the Sarones, rulyng together in Englande, from the raygne of Hengilt, but o Egbert, the first Kyngand Monarche of the whole lande, after the expulsion of the Britaynes.

Now remayneth (by the grace of Chilf) in the next booke following, to profecute the order of fuch kings as principally raigning alone, had this realine in their polletion: from the tyme of Egbert king of welliarons, to the comming of William Conqueror the Roymand, comprehending therin the reft of the next 300, yeares, with the actes & flate of Religion, as in that space was in the Church: wherin may appeare the declining tyme of the Church, and of true Religid, preparing the way to Antichrift, which not long after followed. For here is to be noted, that during yet this mean tyne, Sathan (as is layd) was bound up from his raging and furious violence, counting from the tyme of Confantinus, to the next looling out of Sathan, which was foretold by the Reuclation of S. John about mentioned, to be a thoughand yeares, whereof by the order of the hillory (Christ graunting) more thall be layd hereafter.
