the Lomish people of thes our age easily thenke it to be true when they see it, neither yet thall they beable to deny the fame, to cleave standeth the force of those recordes.

ye heard alittle before, pag. 381. howe John Stratford Archb. of Lant. being lent for and required by the king to come wate hym, refuled to to bo. what the cause was why he denved to come at the kings lending, is neither touched of Politone Wirgil, nor of any other monkily Chronicler, mixting of those actes and times. Whose part bath bene. faithfully to have dispensed the simple truth of thongs don to they, posterity. But that whych they discomblingly and colourably have concealed, contrary to true lawe of floric, the true cause thereof we have found out by the true Parliament roles, occlaring the flory thus.

King Coward the 3. in the s. yeare of hys raigne, hea-ring that Edward Bailol had proclaimed himfelfe kyng of Scotland: Required counfell of the whole effate to wit, whether were better for hym to allayle Scotlande, and to claim the benefing or benicines of the fame: or cls by ma= king byin party to take bys advanitage. And thereby to emoy the fernice, as other hys aunceffers before hym had done. For thys caule be fommoned a Parliament of all cstates to meete at Yorke, about the begynning of Decem= ber, where the kying was alredy coinc, waiting for y com= ming of fuch as were warned thereunto. For the want of whole comming, the parliament was recourned til mon= day, and from thence to Tuciday next enfining. Butforioinuch as most of the states were abient, the assembly re= quired the continuance of the parliament, until the reas of . Billary then enfuing at Yorke, whych was graunted. And to a new fommons was especially awarded to energ person with special charge to attend, so that the affaires of the king and the realine myght not be hindered, because of the debate between the Archb. of Cant. and Archbilliop of Yorke, for the superiour bearing of they cross.

In conclusion, for all the kyings formmoning, none o= ther of all the Clergy came, but onely the Archi. of Yorke, the bythop of Lucolne, and of Carliel, & Abbots of Yorke and Scleby. So that hereunto came not the Archb. of Caterb.noz any other of hys promince, and all for bearing the croffe. Wherby the same was not onely a loffe to the opojtunitie to Scotland: but also an importable charge to the tohole efface by a newe reaffembly. And thus much out of the recordes. whereby thou mayelf ealely judge (prudent Beader) what is to be thought of thele Pope holy Carbolique Churchmen) being of the Popes brode and ferring by whom such frivolous causes of contention ftiere by to luch disquietnes, both among themselves, and also to such disobedience against their 10 inice: excuse them who can. Ex

It followeth moreover in the fame records, concerning the abandoning of the popes provisions; how that the comons finde great default at provisions comming from Kome, wherby ftraungers were enabled win this realme to eniog eccletiatical dignities, a them divers inconvenignics enturing thereby, namely the decay of daily almose, b transporting of the treasure to nourish the kings enemics the disconcring of the secrets of the realine, & the disabling and imponerishing of the clerkes within this realme.

They also shew how the pope had in most concre wyse graunted to two new Cardinalles wythin thys Realme, (and namely to Cardinall Peragots) about ten thouland markes of verely taxes: They therfore required the kying and nobles to funde forme remedy, for that they never could ne would any longer beare those straunge oppressions, or els to helpe them to expell out of thys realme the 19 ones

nower by force.

Herenpon, the King, Lords, and commos, fent for the The acte of act made at Carliel, in the 35. yere of king Coward first, bpon the lyke complaint: thereby forbidding, y any thyng Moulde be attempted or brought into the Realine, whych fould tend to the blemishing of the kings prerogative, 02 to the premoice of bys Lords or commons. And fo at thys time, the statute called the acce of prouision was made by common content, which generally forbiddeth the bringing in of any Bulles, or fuch trinkers from the Court of Rome, or the pling, enloying, or allowing of any fuch bil, process, instrument, or such water, as therby at large both appeare, whereof sufficiently is touched before, pag. 353.

The penalty of whych statute afterwards followed in the next parliament, An. Reg. Ed. 18. tit. 32. the whych penalty was this: the transgressors thereof to lie in perpetual prilon, or to be fortured the land. And that al inflices of allize, gaile delinery, and Dyer and beterminer, map beter= mine the fame. Required withall, that the fame act of pro= uition, thould continue for ener.

Item, that the layd 18, yeare of the raigne of king ed-

ward, tit 34.it was moreover proposided: that if any arch= bythop, or any person religious or other, one not present win 4. monthes some able clerke to any diantite, where ano person bath obtained from Rome any provision, Bul, ec. but succease the same: that then the Byng may present forme able clerke.

Iron, propounded in the layd Parliament, an. 18. Reg. 3. that if any Bylhop elect, thall refuse to take any suche bythoppikes, other then by fuch Bull: that then fuch elect, that not enterne entry bys temporalties without his fpeciall licence:

llicence.
Also, that the king shall dispose all such benefices and benefices onely dianities of suchaliens his enemics, as remain in the coutrey of hys enemyes, and employ the profites therof to the Defence of the realme.

Mojeouer propounded, that commillioners be fent to all the kings portes, to apprehend all fuch persons as that forbidden.an. 18 bring in any fuch instrument froktome, and to bring them reg. Ed. 3. tit. 37. forthwyth before the countaile to answere thereto.

Dropounded farthermore, that the Deanry of Yorke which is to be recoucred by indgemet in the kyings court, may be bestowed upon some able man within the realine, who will maintaine the fame agaynst hym (meaning the Cardinall, who holdeth the fame by promision fro Rome, being the enemy to the king and to the realm) and that the profites may be emploied to the defence of the realme.

D palle farther in the 20, years of the kings reigns in the Parliament holden the same yere, it was propose bed: that all alien Monkes thould anoyde the Acaime by the day of S. Michael, and that they limings fluid be diff poled, to young English scholers. The linings of these the king toke to hys bandes.

Item, that the king may take the profites of all others Arangers linings, as Cardinals and others, during their lines. The profites of who were also in the kings hands.

That fuch aliens enemies, as be advanced to livyings here in England (being in their owne countreys, thomakers, tailers, or chamberlaines to Cardinals) thuid bepart before Wichaelmas, and they lingunges disposed to pope English Cholers. The lynings also of these remarned in the kings bandes.

The commons denied to pay any painent, to any car = tit.32.tit.33. dinals lying in Fraunce, to entreat of war or peace: which allo was graunted of the kings part as reasonable.

Item, propounded and fully agreed, that the yearely aduauncement of two thouland markes (grainted by the pope to two Cardinals, out of the provinces of Canterb. and Porke (Chould be reftrained, and fuche as figall purfue therfore to be out of the law.

Lykewise enacted and agreed, that no Englysh man thould take any thing in ferme of any Alien religious, ne buy any of their gods, not be of they, counfaile, on payne

of perpetuall imprysonment. Enacted further, that no person should bying into the realme to any Bylhop or other, any Bul, or any other lecters from Kome, of from any Alien: unless he shewe the lame to the Chauncelour of warden of the Emque ports,

vpon loffe of all be bath. Finally, in the end of the faid Parliament, the bishops were commanued before the next connocation, to certify into the Chancery the names of fuch Aliens, of their benefices, and the values of the fame.
