being subjecte vnto you, if there be whych haue strayed from the Catholique faith by fuch errours, may be brought home againe, to the laud and honour of his name that was crucified, and prescruation of the true faith. And further our will is, that whatfoeuer you thal do, in the premisses in maner & forme of our processe in this behalfe, to be had and done: that you for your parte, when you shalbe required thereunto, plainly & distinctly do certifie vs by your letters patents, having the tenour hereof.

The conclusions and articles here mentioned in thes letter, are about prefixed. Of which some were codemned for bereticall, some for crroneous.

After this, within fewe dates the forelayd Archbylhop w. Lourney, directed down his letters of admonition to Robert Rigge commillary of Oxford, for the reprelling of thys doctrine. Which yet notwithstanding both then, and yet to this day (Bod be prailed) doth remaine. The copie of his monition to the Commillary here out of hys owne Register, foloweth.

An other letter of the Archb.to the Commillary of Oxford.

N Dei nomine Amen. Where as we William by the permission of God Archbyshop of Canterbury Lorde Primate of England and Legate of the Apostolicall sea, by the consent of our suffra-ganes, have caused to be affembled together divers clerkes both secular and regular of the vniversitie of Oxford, wythin our pro-uince of Canterbury and other Catholicke persons to informe vs of, and vpon certaine conclusions heretical and erroneous generally and commonly preached and published in divers places of the layd prouince of Canterbury to the subuersion of the whole state of the Church, and our sayd prouince: And also mature deliberation had vpon the same: by the common counsaile of the said. our suffraganes & their conuocates, it was declared, that certain of the fayde conclusions, to have bene and be condemned, some for heretical, and some forerroneous, and notoriously repugnate to the determinatio of the church, which we also our felues have declared to be damnable: And haus vnderstode by credible information, and partly by experience that thou Robert Rigge, Chancelor of the vniuerfity aforefaid, hath & doest incline partly to the foresaid damnable conclusions, whome allowe in this part have partly suspected, doest intend to molett these our Clerkes about specified, & others adhering vnto vs in this behalf, as they ought to do:through thy fubtill and fophilicall imaginations, fondry & manifold wayes, therfore we admonish thee M.Robert Chauncelour aforefaid, the first second, and third time, and peremptorily; that thou does not greue, let, or molest, indically, or extraindictally, apertly or princip, or cause to be ground, let and molested, of procure directly or indirectly, by thy selfe, or any other, as much. as in thee lieth to be greued, the forefayd Clerks fecular or regular, or fuch as fauor them in the premisses, in their scholastical acts or in any other condition whatloeuer. And that thou fuffer none, hereafter to teach, maintaine preach, or defend any fuch herefies or errours in the layde Vniuerlitie, either within or wythout the scholes: Neither that thou do admit I. Wickliffe, Nicholas Her ford, Philip Repindon, Iohn Ayshton, or Lauseca Redman, which are vehemently and notorioully suspected of heretie, or any other fo suspected or defamed, vinto that office of preaching. But that thou denounce the sayd persons to be suspended awhom we have furpended from all scholastical act, whilest they cleare their inno-cencie in this part before vs, wider the paine of the greater cutle. which we here in these wrytings denounce against the person at thou shalt not obey those our admonitions with effects, as the crime, subsettle and offence in this behalfe shall require according to this our admonition premifed, which we repute in this parte for canonicall, as well then as now, and now as well as then referuing the absolution of this sentence excommunicatorie, if it happen to light vpon thee, as (Godforbid) specially vnto our selues. John Aylhten lykewife was cramined, and indicially admonished by the said Archbilhop by vertue of his othe, that hee letting alide all sophisticall words & succeives, he fully and planify would tay his minde upon the conclusions aforclayd. And being asked moreourr by the laid Archbilliop inhether he would hanc a further day to deliberate vpon his autwers, as the forefaid Micholas and Whilip had before: faid exprestly that he would not, but would answer presently to those cociu= stons. And so forthall aunswere laybe, as concerning all thele conclutions (containing them all together) that hys tudgement was in this behalf to hold his peace. Whertole the forelaid Archbishop reputing the laide John herein to be inspected, admonished hun in form of words as followseth: we admonish thee John Apshton, whome we repute to be defamed, snotoxionly suspected of heresie, the west, the event, and third time: that in our prounce of Canterbury hereaster, thou do not preach publickely or primately wout our special licence, under paine of the greater curle, which we benefice here by these presents against thy perfon, if thou obey not our monitions, for nowe as for then, And consequently, so, as much as the sayd John being al-ked of the Arebb. consessed that bee had heard before of the publication of the Arebbyshops Mandate, wherein was inhibited y no person prohibited or not sent, should preach hereafter: the forelayde Archb. affigued to hun Friday next folowing, which was the 20, day of the same moueth, after dinner to appeare before hym, either at Lambeth, or in the same place: to say for himselfe, wherefore he myght not be pronounced for an heretick, a for such a one to be denounced through hys whole pronince. Also the said Archbishop affigued to the forelaid Aicholas and Philip, the laide day e place to answer peremptopily, and to say fully a plainty to the conclusions aloresaybe, all sophistication of wordes and disputation fer a part.
