Furthermore, to the lense and text of the firt conclusion, for that they auniwered notfully and expicily, beyng aiked whether God ought any maner of obedience to the Denill ognot: they laid yea, as the obedience of toue, be= cause he loueth him, and punilhed him as he ought. And to proue that Bod ought to to obey the denill, they offered themselves to the tire.

To the ii. conclusion, for that they aunswered not erpielly, being alked whither a pielate might excommunis cate any man being in the flate of grace: laid yea.

Unito the 20. coclusion, for that they answered not fully, fimply, and expectly, being demaunded whether special or genenerall prayers did most profit, and were of greater force: They would not lay but that speciall.

Unto the last conclusion, for that they aunswered ney= ther fumply not expectly, and being demanded particular= ly, whether any frier were bounde to gethis living wyth bis manuall labour, so that it might not be lawfullfor them to line by begging? They would make no aunswere at all.

Afterthat, the forelaid Lord Archb. of Cant. demain= ded of all the forefaid Doctors, what their indgement was touching the autworces that were made boon all a finguier such conclusions. All which doctors and enery of them fenerally, layory there all the autweres genen wato the fielt fecond, third, and firt coclusions (as is before recited) were infufficient, hereticall and fubtill, and that all the aniweres made specially to the renth, ninth, and talt conclusions, as is about mentioned; were infufficiet, erroneous and pernerfe. whereupon the Lord layd Archbilhop of Caunters bury, confidering the layo aunsweres to be hereticall, subtill, ecroneous and pernecle, accordingly as the laid Doc= tois (as is aforciayd) had wayed and confidered: admonis theo the faid Micholas and Phillip lufficiently buder thele forme of wordes.

The name of Christ being called bpon: we william by Bods permillion, Archbilhop of Canterbury, Metropopolitane of al England, and Legate of the Apostolique fee, and through all our pronunce of Counterbury, Inquilitor of all hererical planiticido fufficiently and lawfully admos nift and site you Richolas Derford and Phillip Reping= Don professor Diminitie, having this day and place alfigued you by your own confent and our prefictio, perems proxily to aniwere and to lay, fully and playnely your opimons touching these conclusions whereunto we do referre pou(all fubrill, lophificall, and Logicall wordes fer apart) being therunto fwozne, cited, & commanded: which thyng to do, without cause reasonable of any licence genen thereunto, you neither have bene willing nor are willing, may rather ve contemptuoully refused to aunswere to some of those conclusions before vs indicially, according to the effect of our monition, citation and commaundement before layd. But for that, ye have auniwered buto some of them beretically, and to other some erroncoully, although not fully, two admonths and cite you once, twice, and thice, and that peremitarly: that plainely and fully (all subtile, sophis ficall and logicall wordes fer apart) you and enery of you answer buto the same conclusions, and buto that sense and meaning by vis limitted: buder the payne that otherwise fuch conclusions deserve by you consessed, and that for the fame conclusions you ought to have.

which admonition being made and done, forthat the forelayd Aicholas and Phillip woulde make none other answere: The said Lord archbilly of Launterbury concinded that busines, prefixing and assigning but othe forelayd Michalas and phillips dayes space, that is to say, untill the 27. day of the faine month: And that then they thousde appeare before the layd Lord Archbilhop of Canterbury wherfoeuer within the same his province of Caunterbury hee Choulde fortune to be, to heare his decree that Choulde be made in that behalfe. This done, the forelayd Archbill. of Caunterbury, monified and cited lawfully and lufficisently, John Auftron under the the tenour of these wordes

In the name of Bod: we william by Bods permillio, Archb. of Cant. Primate of all England, Legate of the fee Apoltolicall, and through all our province of Cant. of all heretical pramitie chiefe Inquilitourido monili acise thee, John Alheton mailler of acte, and fludent in divinitie appearing before vs, indicially to lay and speake the playue veritic touching these conclusions to the which we doe res ferre thee and to the which we have caused thee to sweare, laying thy hand upon a booke: as being allo otherwife by be admonthed and commanned to keepe this daye and place by be appointed, for the third time peremptorily, to propose fuch reasonable canse (if thou halt any) wherefore

thou oughtest not to be pronounced an hereticke. And fufficiently and lawfully we month and cite thee, the first, se= cond and third time, and that perceptouly, that thou, fully and playnely (all fubrill, fophilicall, and logicall wordes fet apart) doe aunswere buto the same conclusions, buter the payne that unto such conclusions belong & on thy part confessed, and that thou for suche conclusions oughtest to fuffer. whiche monition, being thus premifed: The layde I. Afreton feux Archbishop read the first conclusion, and of the layd John rally examined. inquired what was his opinion and meaning therein, and hereupon he laid his minde concerning the forelayd monttion. Then, the forefaid John Afteron being often required by the archbiftion that he woulde aunifere in the Latine tongue to those questions which were demaunded of his Friers doe him, because of the lay people that stood about him: he cry= ing out into the Englishe tongue, bettered frivolous and approbrious contumelies to move and excite the people against the said Archbishop as it should seem. Acyther bid he unto the first conclusion nor unto any of their other cous clulions, effectually and pertinently feeme to them to aun= fwere: but rather by the subtilities, & thistes, saying often-times and as expectly as Luke said, it was sufficient to him to believe as the holy Church believed. Then the laid Arch-bilhop examined him opon the first conclusion touching f Sacrament of the aulter: whether, that after the wordes of confectation, there remagneth materiall bread particuler bread, or buinerfall bread? De fayde the matter paffed his understanding, and therefore said the woulde in that forme riall bread reand maner auniwere and otherwise not. But amongest o= ther things, he spake in deriding wife but o the laid Archb. against this worde Wateriall, laying, you may put that in your purse if you have any. whereupon the laid Archbi= thop, calling that an unwife and foolishe aunswere as the rest of the doctors did (of whome mention was made be-fore) rather for that he was a graduatin the schooles, farther proceeded against the said John Alheton in this wise.

And thou John Albeton monified and commanuded by vs as is aforelayd, after thine oth taken: without anye reasonable cause of any other other licence, neither woul-best thou not yet will, but resused and yet does contemptuoully, to auniwere buto inch conclusions before vs, indici= ally according to our monition & commandement aforciad doe hold all fuch conclutions by thee confessed, a thee tipe foresaid John with all thy said conclusions, convicted. And therfore we do pronounce and declare by fentence gening, that thou John Alhton cocerning thole cociulions, which by bs with good deliberation of diners prelates our luffraganes, and also divers and londry professours of divinitie, and other wife men and learned in the lawe according to y Canonicall lanctions, being condemned and declared for an bereticke and bereticall: to have bene and ftill is, an he reticke, and thy conclusions heretical. And as touching thy other conclusions by vs hertofore counted erroneous, and for erroneous condemned: we doe pronounce and declare sententially by these our writinges, that both thou half er-

red and doeff erre.

Upon the lame 20. day of June in the yeare and place aboue recited: the forelaid Lord of Caunterbury being de= lirous, as be precended to be informed by Thomas Bilmā bacheler of diminitie there being present and somewhat fa= nouring the laid M. John Albeton what his indgement & opinion was touching y forefaid conclusions: prefixed and The roaday of affigued buto the laid Thomas (for that time demannding Inne. the fame deliberation and day) 8. dayes after, that is to fay the 18. of the fair month: that he appeare before the Billiop of Cant. where locuer within his faid province of Canter= bury, he fhould then happen to be, to beclare playnely and fully what his indgement and opinion was, touching the forciaid conclutions, Ex Regist W. Courtney.
