Thera.day of Iuly, an. 1382. Excommunication to be denonneed at Paules croffe.

William by Bods permillion Archb. of Cammerb. &c. this instaunt sonday shall preach at Paules cross in London, Salutatio, grace and blessing. For asmuch as not prefixed a certaine competent day and place to mailten Richoles Herford, and maister Phillip Reppingto, Lanon Regular of the Monastery of our Lady of Leicelber, beying Doctours of Dimittic and of hereical planitie, vehemerly fulpected: After certayne auniweres not fully made, but impertinently and nothing to the purpole, as also hereti= call and crroneous: In dincrs places of our laid pronince commonly, generally, and publikely ranght and preached, and therfore that they should indicially appears before us, to doe a to recease peremtorily in that behalfe, what thing focuer the qualitie of that bulines (houlde moue buto be: and that we have for their contumacie in not appearing before us at that day and place indicially appoynted as right therein required: we by these presentes commaund a commit buto you, firmely emorning you, that when all the multitude of people halbe gathered together to heare your fermorthat in the day and place appoynted you publikely and folemuly denotice the forelaid Richolas & tohilthrowing downe the same boon the ground, to have bene to and in luch maner excommunicated and fill be.

Fare ye well. In our Manour house at Lambeth, the 13. day of Auly, the yeare of our Lozd, 13 8 2. and first yeare of our translation.

William by the grace of God &c. To our welbeloued sonne M.Robbert Rigge chauncellour of the Vniuerfitie of Oxford falutation &c. For as much as we have prefixed a competent day and place to M Nicholas Heerford, and M. Phillip Reppington &c.as before. We straightly charge and commaund you that you publiquely and folemnly demounce in the church of our Lady, and in the scholes of the Vniuersity, the foresayd Nicholas and Phillip, to have bene by vs excommunicated and still is. And that you further cite or cause to be cited peremptorily, the forefayd Nicholas and Phillip, that they and euery of them appeare before vs within 15.dayes after the date of this citation, wherefoeuer it shall fortune vs, within our fayd prouince of Caunterbury then to be:To heare and see how we meane to proceed against them, and enery of them concerning the forefayd hereticall and erroneous conclusions, according to the forme of retroactions and qualitie of the busines in this behalfe had and yied. And that both of the day of the receipt of this present citation, of the maner and forme thereof, or if that you shall apprehend by personal citation the sayd Nicholas and Phillip or either of them, or which ther they shall be absent and hide themselves, as of every thing els which in this behalfe you shall thinke meete to be done: that betweene this and the feast of S Laurence, you clerely certifie vs by your letters patentes contayning the effect of these thinges.

Butas his labour is pall, so his reward will fellow ac what day the great Archbilliop of our louies, Chail indirially appears in his tribunall feat, to under both the quick and the dead.
