An other letter of the K.to the Vicechancellor.

The king: To the Chauncellour and the procuratours of the verificiant Conferd which niuersitie of Oxford which now be, or for the time being shall be: Greeting, Moued by the zeale of christian fayth, whereof we be and alwayes will be defenders, and for our foules health induced thereunto, having a great defire to represse, and by condigne punishmet to restraine the impugners of the foresaid fayth, which newly and wickedly go about and presume to sow their naughty and peruerse doctrine within our kingdome of England, and to preach and hold damnable conclusions so notoriously repugnant and contrary to the same faith, to the peruerting of our subjectes and people as we understand: Before they any further proceed in their malicious errours, or els infect others: We have by these presentes appoynted you to be inquisitour generals(all the chiefe diuines of the sayd vniuersitie being your assistents) and the same likewise to be done of all and fingular the Graduates, Divines, & lawyers of the same vniuersitie. And if they shall know any which be of the iurisdiction of the sayd vniuersitie of Oxford, whiche be probablie of them to be suspected in the sauour, belyefe, or defence of anye herefie or errour, and especially of any of the conclusions publiquely condemned by the reverend Father, William Archbishop of Canterbury, by the Counsaile of his Clergye, or els of any other conclusion like vnto anye of them in meaning or in wordes: and that if henceforth you shall finde any that shall beleue: fauoure, or defend anye of the foresayd heresies or errours or anye other fuche like, or els which shall be so bolde to receaue into their houses and Innes Maister Iohn Wickliffe, M. Nich. Herforde, M. Phillip Repingdon, or M. Iohn Asheton, or anye other noted by probable suspicion of anye the foresayd heresies or erroures, or any other like vnto them in meaning or in worde: Or that shall presume to communicate with anye of them, or els to defend or fauour anye of suche fauourers, receauers communicantes and defendours: within 7. dayes after the same shal appeare and be manifest vnto you, to banish and expell them from the Vniuerfitie and towne of Oxford, till fuch time as they shall declare their innocency before the Archbishop of Caunterbury for the time being, by manifest purgation. So notwithstanding, that such as be compelled to purge themselues, you certifie vs and the sayd archbishop vnder your seales, fro time to time within one month that they be such maner of men. Commaunding furthermore, that thorough all the halles of the fayd vniuerfitie, ye cause dilligently to be searched and inquired out of had: If any man haue any book or tractation of the Edition or compiling of the forefayd M. John Wickliffe, or Nicholas Herford: and that when and wherfoeuer ye shall chaunce to finde any such booke or tractation, ye cause the same to be arested and taken, and onto the foresayd Archbishop within one month (without correction, corruption, or mutation, whatsoeuer)word for word,&sentece for sentence, to be brought and presented And therefore we straightly enioine and command you, vpon your fidelitie and allegeaunce wherein ye stand bound vnto vs, and vpon payne of forfaiture of all and finguler your liberties and privilegies of your fayde universitie, and of all that euer you haue besides: that you geue your diligent attendance vp6 the premiffes, and that well and faythfully you execute the same in maner and forme aforefayd. And that you obey the forefayde Archbishop, and his lawfull and honest mandates, that he shall thinke good to direct vnto you in this behalfe, as it is meete ye should. And we geue in charge vnto the Vicechauncellour and Mayor of Oxford for the time being, and to all and finguler our Sheriffes, vndersheriffes, Bayliffes, and subjectes, by these presents: that they ayde, obey, and be attendaunt vpon you in the execution of the premisses, In witnes whereof, &c. Witnesse the King at Weitminster, the 13. day of July, the fixte yeare of hys raigne.

The 13. day of July,an. 1382. An other tharp letterof K.Rich. ient to Oxford agaynst Wicklifte and his fellowes. The effect of the kings letter briefly compre-hended.

Belides thele letters patentes the laid young King moued by the unquyet importunitie of the Archb. Icndeth moreover an other special letter to the Wicechancelloz and proctors of the Univerlitie of Oxforde, wherein under a pretented scale of before of Christian fayth, he firaightlye and tharply eniounch & affigueth them (but he biter abolithing of those conclusions & opinions) to make a generall Augustion through the whole muertice as welf for the united strong the whole muertice as welf for the parties aforesaid, John wicklisse. Picholas Bersord, Phillip Repington, John Alhton, & such other, as also sor al other who they know or inage to be inspected of p do= ctrine, or to be mayntayners, receamers, and defenders of forelayd parties, or their conclusions any maner of way,

to the intent that they being so apprehended through their diligent fearth, may be win 7. dayes of their admonitions expulled the vinneritic, and cited by to the archb. of Caut. before him to appeare, and to fland to their answers. willing moreouer and commanding the faid vicethamicelloz & proctors with other regents their attiffers, that if any perion or persons in any ponse, hall, or colledge, or in anye other place thalbe found to have any of they? books, of treatiles compiled by the layd John wickliffe. Richolas Berford ec. they will cause without delay & sayd person or perfons, with they, bookes to be arefted and attached, # pic= fented within one month, without correction, corruption, or mutation, to the foreign Archbilliop, wpon their fayth and allegeance, as they will anoyo the forfaiture of all and finguler the liberties and princledges to the unincestity a= perrayning. And that they will be obedient to the Archb. aforefayd in the ordering hereof, and all other his inninetions to be obeyed in all thinges lawfull and honest. Beuing moreouer in these our letters charge and commann= dement to the Mayor, Bayliffes and other the inhabitants of Oxford, to be alliftant and attendant buto the foreland vicethancelog and proctors, touching the execution of the premilles, bearing the bate of the courteenth day of July: of Iuly, an, which was the yeare of our Lozd. 1382.

A Matters incident of Robert Rigges, Vicechauncellor of Oxford Nicholas Herford, and Phillip Repington, with other.

De vicechaunceloz the same time in Oxforde was M. Robert Rigges. The 2. proctors were John Bunt-man, woalter Dilhe, who then as favre as they durit, fanoured the cause of John wickliffe and plide. In so much p the same time and yeare, which was an. 1382. When certaine publicke fermons Chould be appoynted customably at y feast of the Ascention, and of Corpus Christi, to be preached in the cloyster of S. Frideswyde (now called Christis church) before the people, by the direchanceller asoreson the protocourse the record the vicechannellor as forciaid and proctors had committed to 19hillip Incpington, and M. Her. so y P. Her. shold preach on y Alecution day, and Repungton by Corpus Christiday) First Herford beginning was noted to defend John wickliffe.ovely to be a faythful, good, a innocent manifor the which no finall adoc with outcries was amongst the Fryers. This Wickliffe. Herford, after he had long favoured & may may not wick-liftes part, grew first in suspicion amongs the enemies of the truth. For allowe as he began somewhat liverally and frecht o pronounce & vicer any thing which tended to the befence of wickliffe, by and by the Carmelices, and al the orders of religion were in his top, and laid not a few here fies who his charge, the which they had frayned here and there out of his fermons, & had copyled together in a certaine forme, by the handes of a certaine notaties, through the industry & diligence of one peter Stokes a Carmelice a kind of people prone & ready to all kinde of mischiefe, Repington opposes, debate, and discention. After this the feast of Corfield Chand pus Christi dine neare, uppon which day it was looked for of Leicester, that Repington Mould preach. This man was a Canon after B.of of Leiceller, & had before taken his first degree vitto Doc-Lincolne. toithip: who picaching the same time at Bradgate for the fame Sermon be became first suspected, and hated of the Pharisaicall broode of the Fryers. But through the great and notable described of his wit, (which all men did be-bold and see in him) accompanied with like modelly and honelly; he did to ourrome, or at the least assume thys cruelly and perfectition whiche was towardes bin, that thouty after, by the content of the whole fellowship, he Repington was admitted doctour. Who as soone as he had taken it commensed by he stepped forth in the schooles, and Doctor. began immediately to theweforth and veter, that whiche he had long hidden and diffembled. Protesting opely, that in all morall matters, he would defend wickliffe. But as touching the facrament he woulde as yet hold his peace, butill suche time as the Lorde thall otherwise illuminate the harres and mindes of the dergye.

Nowe the day of Corpus Christi asoxclayd approching neare, when the Aryers understood that this man thould picach thortly, fearing least that he would rub the galles of their religion, they connented with the Archb. of Cant. that the same day a little before that 19 hillip shold preach: wickliffes conclusions which were prinately condemned, thould be openly distance in the presence of the whole ve ninerlitie. The doing of which matter, was committed to Peter Stokes Fryer, flonderd bearer and chiefe champion of that live against wickliffe.
