Margaret in the town of Linne, appeared before the Bishop of Rozwich, in the presence of John de Derlington, Archdeacon of Rozwich, doctor of the decrees, Frier walter Ville, and John Kikinghall professors in dininitie, william Carlton, doctor of both lawes, and w. Frifeby, to huge Bhild-ham, publike Motaryes: and there publikely affirmed and

held, the conclusions, as before is specified.
All and singular the premisses the foresayde william affirmed upon mature deliberation.
