In English. Ignorance the mother of error so much hath binoced and deceived certaine persons, to witte, Hugh Penny, John Forstal, John Boy, John Wanderton, Will. Haywarde, and John White, tenaunts of the Lord of Wengham: that against the coming of the aforeclayde Archibishop to his palace of Canterbury on Palmes Sunday even, the yeare of our Lord 1390, where they being warned by the baillife, to convey and carry hay, strawe, and other littour to the aforesayd palace, as they were bounde by the tenor of their landes, which they hold of the see of Canterbury: refusing and disdaining to doe their due service, as they were accustomed, brought their strawe and other littour, not in cartes and waines openly & sufficiently, but by pece meale, and clostly in bagges or lasses, in contempt of their Lord, and derogation of the right and title of the see of Canterbury, wherupon they being ascerte & presented before the archb. sitting in iudgement at his manour of Statewood, yelded and submitted themselves to his Lordshypes pleasure, humbly cravng pardon of their trespass. Then the aforesayd archbishop absolued the above named Hugh Penny, &c. they swearing to obey the lawes and ordynance of holy church, and so do the punishment that shuld be appoynted them for their deseretes, that is: that they going laynurely before the procession, every one of them shold carry openly on his shoulder, his bagge stufed with hay and strawe, so that the sayd hay and strawe shold appere hanging out, the mouthes of the lasses being open.

* Notes of certayne Parliament matters
passed in this kings dayes.

To procede now further in the raigne of this king, & to iurate also some thing of his parlementes, as we haue done of certeine before, first we wil beginne with the Parlement holden in the first yere of hys commynge in.

Agreuer, sofasmuch as our Catholike papistes will not believe yet the contrary, but that the iurisdiction of their father the pope hathuer extended throughout all y' world, as well here in England as in other places: here therefore speaking of the Parlementes holden in this kings dayes concerning thys matter, I refer them to the Parlement of the layd king Henry in his first yere holden, and to the 27. article of the same, where they may reade in the 10. obiecti on laid against R. Richard in plaine words: how that, for almuch as the crowne of this realme of England, and the iurisdiction belonging to y' same, as also the whole realme it selfe, at all times lately past, hath ben at such libertie, and enjoyed such prerogative, that neyther the Pope, nor any other out of the same kingdome ought to intrude himselfe, nor intermedle therin: it was therfore obiecte unto the forenamed king Richard the 2. for procuring the letters Apostolical from the Pope, to the confirming and coroboration of certayne statutes of hys, and that hys censure myght be prosecuted against the breakers therof. Whiche seemed then to the Parlement, to tend against the crowne and regall dignite, as also against the statutes & liberties of the said thys our realme of England. Act. Parl. An. 1. Reg. Henrici 4. Furthermore, in the second yere of the saide king, thys was in the Parliament required, that all such persones as shalbe arrested by force of the statute made against the Lollardes, in the 2. yere of Henry 4. may be bailed, and freely make their purgation: That they be arrested by none other then by the Sheriffes or such like officers, neither that any hauocke be made of their goods. The king granted to take aduise therein.

In the 8. yere moreouer of thys kings raigne, it was likewise propounded in the Parliament, that all such persones as shall procure or sue in the court of Rome any proesse touching any benefice, collation, or presentation of the same, shal incurre the paine of y' statute of prouisors, made

in the 13. yere of Richard 2. whereunto the king granted, that the statutes heretofore propounded shoud be obserued.

Item, in the sayde Parliament, there it was put vp by petition, that the king might enioy halfe the profits of every parsones benefice, who is not resident theron. Therunto the king answered, that the ordinaries shoud do theyr duties therein, or els he would prouide further remedie, to stay their pluralities.

Item, in the sayde Parliament, it was required: that none do sue to the court of Rome for any benefice, but only in the kings courtes.

[In the next yere folowing, which was the 9. of this Byng, an other petition of the Commons was put vp in Parliament against the court of Rome, whiche I thought god here to expresse as foloweth.

The Commons do beseeche, that sofasmuch as diuers prouisors of the benefices of holy Church, dwelling in the Court of Rome, through their singular covetousnes now newly imagined to destroy those that haue bene long time incumbents in diuers their benefices of holy church peaceably, some of them by the title of the king, some by title ordinary, and by the title of other true patrois therof, by coulor of prouisions, collacions, and other grauantes made to the sayd prouisors by the Apostle, of the layd benefices, do puerle processes in the said court by citation made beyond the sea, without any citations made within the Realme in dede against the same incumbents, whereby many of the said incumbents through such priuy & crafty processes and sentences of priuation and inhabilitacion, haue lost theyr benefices, and others put in the places of the saide incumbents before the publication of the same sentence, they not knowing any thyng, and many are in great ballarde to lose theyr benefices through such processes, to thez perpetuall destruction and mischiefe: and sofasmuch as thys mischiefe cannot be holpen wythout an especiall remedy be had by parliament: Prayseleth it the king to consider the great mischiefe and daunger that may so come vnto diuers his subiects without their knowledge through such citations out of the realme, and therupon to ordaine by the aduise of the Lords of this present Parliament, that none presented, be received by any ordinarie vnto any benefice of any such incumbent for any cause of priuation or inhabilitacion wherof the processe is not founded vpon citation made wythin the realme, and also that such incumbents may remaine in all theyr benefices, until it be proved by due enquest in the court of the King, that the citations wherupon such priuations & inhabilitacions are graunted, were made vnto in the Realme: and that if such Ordinaries, or such presented or others, doe pursue the contrary, that then they and theyr procurators, factours and counsellours doe incurre the paines contained in the statute made against prouisors in the 13. yere of the raigne of the late Richard king of England the second, by processes to be made as is declared in the statute made against suche prouisors in the 27. yere of the raigne of king Edward, predecessor to our Lorde the king that nowe is, any roiall licencys or grauantes in any manner to the contrary notwithstanding, and that all other statutes made against prouisors, and not repealed before this present Parliament, be in their full force, and be firmly kept in all payntes.

That the kings counsell haue power by authoritye of Parliament, in case that any man finde himselfe grieved in particular, that he may pursye: and that the said counsel by the aduise of the justices do right vnto the parties. This to endure vntil the next parliament, reseruing alwayes unto the king his prerogative and libertie.

Item, that no Popes collector thenceforth shoud leny any money within the realme, for first frutes of any ecclesiastical dignite, under payne of incurring the statute of prouisions.

Besides in the sayd Parliament holden the 11. yere of this king, is to be noted: how the commissons of the land, put vp a Bill vnto the kyng, to take the temporall landes out from spirituall mens handes or possession. The effecte of which Bill was, that the temporallities, disorderately wasted by men of the Churche, might suffice to lende to the x. x. Earles, x. C. Knightes, vi. M. & C. Esquires, and a C. houses of almose, to the relife of pore people, moe then at those dayes were wythin England: And ouer all these foresayd charges, the king might put yearly in his cosers xx. M. pound.

Propounded, that every Earle shoud haue of yeres rent iii. M. marke, and every Knight C. marke, and iii. plough landes: Every Esquier pl. marke by yere, with ii. plough landes, & every house of almose C. marke, wþch oversight of two true seculars vnto every house: And also with pro-
