Pope Iohn fled out of Costance

dementes, of the lone and knowledge of Bod, of Matrimony, of Denaunce, of the three enemies of mankinde, of the player of our Loid, and of the Supper of our Loid.

The same day 19 ope John the 23, chauged his apparell & conneyed himselfe secretly out of Constance, fearing the indgemer by the which afterward he was deprined or his Papall dignitie, by meanes of most crecrable & abhomina ble forfaites and dovnacs. This was the cause that John Bus was trasported and carled buto an other prison : for the 19 opes fervauntes which had the charge and keeping of John Dus, understanding that their Maister was fled æ gone, delinered by the keyes of the prison buto the Em= perone Signimund, and to the Carbinals, and followed their Mailler the Pope. Then by the whole colent of the Councell, the layd John Bus was put into the handes of the Bylhop of Constance, who fent him to a Castle on the other lide of the Riner of Rhine, not very facre from Co= france, whereas he was thut op in a Tower, with fetters on his legges, that he could fearle walke in the day tyme, and at night her was fastened by to a racke agaynst the wall hard by his bed.

Noble men of Boheme labour for John Hus.

The fafe coduct of the Emperor

chalenged.

In the meane leason certains noble men and Bentle= men of Pole & Boheme, did al their indenour to purchase his delinerannee, having respect to the good renowne of all the Realme, the which was wonderfully defamed and flaundered by certaine naughty persons. The matter was growne onto this pointe, that all they which were in the towns of Constance, that seemed to beare any savour onto I. Bus, were made as mocking flocks, and devided of all men, yea even of the flaves and base people. Wherfore they tooke counsell and cocluded together to present their requell in writing buto the whole Coucell, or at the leaft buto the foure nations of Almaine, Italie, France, and England: this request was presented the 14. day of Way. an, 14.15. The tenour here enfueth,

The first schedule or Bill, whiche the nobles of Boheme deliuered vp to the Councell for the deliueraunce of John Hus, the 14. day of May. Anno. 1415.

Most rencred Fathers and Lordes. The Aobles and Lordes of Boheme and Pole here prefent, by this their present writinges doe shew and declare buto your Fatherly reperences how that the most noble Bying and Low the Low Sigilmumd kying of Romaines, alwayes Augustus kying of Dungary, Croatia, Dalmatia, ac. bearrying of the great differential was in the kyingdome of Boheme as heyre, Kyng and Lord fuccesour, willyng & mynding to forefee and provide for his owne honour, he fent theie Roble men Maifter wencellate de Duba and John de Clum here prefent, that they would bryng and affire Mailter John Bus under the kying his name and fafe conduct. So that he would come to the facted gene= rall Councell of Constance, under the fafe conduct of the fayd kyng, and the protection of the facred Empire, open= ly genen and graunted buto the layd Maifter John Dus, that hee might purge hintelfe and the kyngdome of 130= heme from the flaunder that was rayled byon them, and there to make an open declaration of his fayth to energ man that would lay any thying to his charge. The which the layd Aobles with the forenamed Maister John Bus have performed and done, according to the kynges com= maundement.

when as the layd Mailler John Bus was freely of his owne accorde come buto Constance, buder the layd late conduct, a grenoully imprisoned before he was heard, and at this present is tormented both with fetters and also with hunger and thirft. Albeit that in tymes past at the Counsell holden at Paylan . 1410. yeare of our Lord , the heretickes whiche were condemned, were luffered to remayne there at libertie, and to depart home freely: Pot-withflandyng this Maifter John Buffe, neither beyng connicted not condemned, no not fo much as once heard, is taken and impriloned, when as neither any king or a= ny Prince Elector, either any Emballadour of any Uninerlitie was yet come or prefent. And albeit the Lord the Myng, together with the Pobles and Lordes here prefent most instantly required and desired, that as touchying his late conduct they would forefee and have respect but his honour. And that the layd Mailter John Bus might be openly heard, for so much as he would render and thew a reason of his fayth, and if he were found or connicted obstinately to affirme or maintagne any thing against the truth or holy Scripture, that then he ought to correct and amend the same, according to the instruction and determis

nation of the Councell; yet could hee never obtayne this,

But the layd Maister John Bulle, notwithstanding all The extrethis, is most grenously oppressed with fetters and grons, mities Iohn and so weakened with thinne and Cender diece, that it is to be feared leaft that his power and strength beying here= red in prison by confunced and wasted, hee should be put in danniger of his witte or reason.

Hus fuffe-

And although the Lordes of Boheme here present are greatly Caundered, because they leving the layd Maister John Hus, so to be tornieted and croubled contrary to the kyngs iafe conduct, have not by their letters put the kyng m mynde of his layd lafe conduct, that the layd Lord and kyng thould not any more fuffer any fuch matters, for fo much as they tend to the contempt and difregard of the kingdome of Boheme, which fro the first originall and begrunging, fince it receased the Catholickefayth, it never departed of went away fro the obscience of p holy Church of kome: yet norwithitandyugthey have fuffered abounc all these thynges patiently betherto, least by any meanes occasion of trouble or veration of this sacred Councell

might arife or fpryng therof.

wherfore most reverend fathers & Lordes: The Mobles and Lordes before named do wholy a most carnestly Delire & require your renerences here present, that both for the honour of the lafe conduct of our layd Lord the kyng, & also for the preservation and encrease of the worthy fainc and renowme both of the forelayd kyugdome of Boheme, squir own also, that you will make a short end about the assayres of M. John Hus: for so much as by the meanes of his Araite handling he is in great daunger by any loger delay, cue as they do most specially trust bpo the most bp= right consciences & judgementes of your fatherly reneres ces. But foralmuch as most revered fathers and Lordes, it is now come to the knowledge and underliading of the Robles & Loudes of Boheme here pelent, how that cer-taine backbiters and flauderers of the most famous kingdom of Bobeme aforelayd, have declared a told buto your reverences how that the Sacrament of the most precious blond of our Lord is carried up & downe through Boheme in vestels not colectated of balowed, and that Coblers do now heave confessions & minister the most blessed body of our Lord unto others: The Mobles therfore of Boheine here present require and delire you that you will gene no credit onto faile promoters & tale tellers, for that as most wicked and naughty flaunderers & backbiters of f kingdone aforefaid, they do report & tel untruthes: requiring also your renerences, that such flanderous persons of the kingdome asociato, may be named & knowne. And y lord the king together with your revereces, shal well perceive and fee that the Lordes of Boheme will go about in fuch maner to refell and put away the falle & fruolous flaunders of those naughty persons, that they shall be ashamed to appeare hereafter before the lord the kying and your red uerences.

As lone as this their supplication was red, y bythop The Bythop of Luthonis riling op laid. Most reverend fathers I well of Luthonis. perceincand understand that the last part of this writing both touch me, my familiars & frends, as though f king-

dom of Boheme were flaundered by vs. wherfore I defire to have time & space of deliberation that I may purge my felfe from this crime that is laid against me. The principal of the couniel appointed him from day of May, at from the day the loads of Boheme should be present again, to heare both the aunivocr of the councell, and also the excuse of the billyop of Luthonis, p which thing in dede was afterward performed: for the 17, day of May, which was the 4. day before the whitlantive they meet there agains, where first
