the quiete appealing of all fuch tumultes and rumours, rifing and springing in the sayde kingdome of Boheme, or else where: the anoiding of which most perillous vprours, the saide king of Romaines doth greatly defire and wish, as the right heire and succes-

four of the fayd kingdome.

Whereuppon the Barons and Nobles aforefayde, most humbly defire and require, the premisses being considered, and respect had vnto the great infamie and flaunder which may happen by the premisses vnto the sayde kingdome and inhabitants thereof, that you will put to your handes, and take some order & meane, that maister Iohn Hus may be distinctly hearde by some famous men, deuines already deputed, or otherwise to be appoynted vpon all and fingulare fuch articles as shall be laide vnto him to declare his owne minde and intent, and also the minde of the do-Ctours alleadged for his purpose, with the manifolde distinctions and equiuocations; in the which the drawers out of the most part of his articles have also made equivocations, that so according vnto the disposition of witnesses, of the which a great number of them are and haue a long time bene his mortall ennemies, that at the friuolous instigation of his enemies, when hee was miterably deteined prisoner, that he should not be condemned unheard For fo muche as by the fayde declarations your fatherly reuerences might be the more better informed of the trueth, hee hymfelfe is ready alwaies to submit himselfe under the determination of thys most facred councell. For your reuerences, by the craftie and fained persivasions of his ennemies, are thus informed, that M Iohn Hus hath bene vncurably oblinate by a long time in most perillous articles, the which your reuerences may nowe plainely perceiue to be vntrue, and for the more euidence heerein to be shewed, there is presented vnto your reuerences an instrumente of publike recognition of the moste reuerend father in Christe, the Lorde Nicholas Bishop of Nazareth and Inquisitour of heresies, specially appoynted by the Apostolike sea in the dioces of Prage, the which by your reuerences is more diligently to be hearkened vnto.

Wherefore it may please your fatherly reuerences to com-maund the sayd M Iohn Hus neither conuicted nor condemned, to be taken and brought out of his bondes and chaines, in the which he is nowe most greeuously deteined and kept, and to put him into the hands of some reuerend Lordes, Byshops, or commisnor couching finners appointed or to be appointed by this prefent councell be deliuered. That the fayd M.Iohn Huffe may fomewhat be releued and recouer againe his health, and be the more diligently and commodioullye examined by the Commissioners: and for the more affurance, the Barons and Nobles aforefayd of the kingdome of Boheme, will prouide most fure and good sureties, the which wil not breake their fidelity and faith for any thing in the worlde. Which also shall promise in his behalfe, that hee shall not slee or departe out of their handes, vntill suche time as the matter be fully determined by the fayd Commissioners. In the execution of the which promifes wee haue determined to prouide and foresee vnto the fame and honour of the faid kingdome of Boheme, and also to the fafeconducte of the moste worthy Prince, the king of Romaines, least that the enemies and detractours of the honoure and same of the kingdome aforefayd, might not a little flander and reproue the faid Lordes, pretending and shewing forth hereafter, that they had made vnrealonable or vnlawfull requelts: for the withstading of which mischiefe, we require your fatherly reuerences, that you will decree, & most graciously consent that this our petition and supplication may be drawen out againe by your Notarie, and reduced into a publicke forme and order.

> After this supplication was read before the deputies of the 4. nations, the Patriarche of Antioch answered in the name of them all unto energarticle of the layd supplicati-

on, but it was done in few wordes.

First, as touching the procestation of John Bus, whe= ther it be true of talle, it ligalbe made enident in the processe of his cause. Moreover, wheras they say that the aduersa= ries of John Bus hath perucrity drawen certains thinges out of his bokes, that also the matter it selfe shall declare in the end, where as if it halve found & decreed that John Hus is bounfily & butruly accused, that the it shal come to palle, y his aductionies thall incurre perpetuall ignoming and faunder. But as rouching fureties, albeit there might be a thouland put in 03 bold, yet can it not by any meanes be, that the deputies of the Councell with a lake conscience may receive of take them in this mans cause, buto whome there is no faith or credite to be gene. Howbeit thus much they wildo, voon the stay of June next, John Hus Chall be brought againe onto Constance, and there have free li= bertie to speake his minde before the Councell, & that they wold louingly and gently heare him: but the matter in the endefell out farre contrary to thys promife.

The fame day the faide Barons and Lordes prefented a supplication of thes tenour buto the Emperoz: Vinto the most highe and mighty Prince, the Lorde Sigismundking of the

Romaines, alwaies Augustus king of Hungarie, Croatia, and Dalmatia, our most gracious Lord faithful & true service in althings, and at all times. Most noble Prince and gracious Lord, we signifie vnto your worthinesse, that we all together with one minde, confent and accord have delivered vp vnto the reverend fathers and Lordes, the deputies of the 4 nations, and to the whole facred Councel of Constance, this our supplication here under wrytten. as reasonable, inst, and worthy of consideration, the tenour where of here followeth word by word, and is this.

C The copie of the supplication, which was preferred onto the deputies of the councel, is before written, where= unto this which followeth was annexed.

W Herefore we most humbly require and desire your prince-The Barons supplication to ly maiestie, that both for the loue of instice, and also of the the king for I. fame and renowne of that moste famous kingdome of Boheme, whereof wee acknowledge you vindoubtedly the true Lorde and heire fucceffour, and also foreseeing viito the liberty of your safe-Hus. conduct, that you wil with your fauourable countenance, beholding these most reasonable and just supplications, which we have put vp to the Lordes aforefayd, put to your helping hand toward the fayd most reuerend fathers and Lordes, that they will effectually heare vs, in this our most just petition, which we have offered vp to them, as is aforesaide: least that the enemie of the renowme and honour of the famous kingdome of Boheme, and fuch as oure flaunderers also hereafter may detracte and sclaunder vs, that wee should make vnreasonable and vnlawfull requests vnto the sayde reuerend fathers and Lordes, and therefore we required and defired of them that it would please them to decre by setting to their publicke hand & seale to authorise our said supplication. Likewise we do most hartily require your highnes, that you would vouchfafe in like maner to gene vs your testimonie of the premises.

But what answere the Emperormade hecreimto, we could never buderstand or know, but by the process of the matter a man may easily indge, that thys good Emperour was brought and lead even vito thes pognt, through the obstinate milchiefe of the cardinals and billiops, to breake and fallify his promise and faith, whych hee had made and promifed, and this was their reason, whereby he was driitenthereunto: that no defence coulde of might be genen either by lafe conducte, or by any other meane unto hym, whych was suspected or sudged to be an hereticke, But by the Epittles and letters of John Bus, a manmay callly indge: what the kings nunde was. Now we will procede in the hillorie.

The saday of June, the Cardinals, Bylhops, and the rest of the pricits, al that were almost in Constance, allembled to agreat number, at the Couent of the Franciscanes in Constance, and there it was commaunded, that befoze John Bus Choulde be brought forth, in hys absence thep should rehearle the witnesses and articles, which they had Caunderoully gathered out of his bothes : the whych arti= cles with John Bulles answer we will hereafter repeate. By chance there was then present a certaine Notary, named Peter Mladoniewitz, the whych bare great loue and amity buto the faid Dus, who allowe as he perceived that the Bilhops and cardinals were already determined and appoynted to condemne the layor articles in the ablence of John Bus, hee went withall speede onto maister wencelate de Duba, and John of Clum, e tolde them al the matter: who incontinent made report therofto the Emperous. who binderstanding their intent, sent Lewes the Countie Palantine of Deyociberge, and the Lord Frederick, Burgrave of Auremberge, to lignify buto them, whych ruled the councel, that nothing thould be refolued or done in the cale of John Bus, before that it wer first heard with equity: and that they flould send him all such articles as were laid against the layd Hus, which were either false or hereticall, the would do so much, that the said articles shoulde be examined by good and learned men. Then according to the Emperois will, the judgement of the principals of the Councell was fulpended, vitill fuche time as John Bus were present.

In the meane lealon thele gentlemen, malter of Dube and of Clum, did gene buto the two Princes whych the Emperor had fent, certaine smal treatiles which the sayde Dus had made, out of p which they had drawn certain articles to present unto them which ruled the councel, under this condition, that they would render them againe, where they should demand them. The intent smeaning of these Barons was, y by thys meanes the aducrfaries of John Bus might y more eatily be reproued, y which of a naughty and corrupt confcience, had picked out corrupt fenteces out of the faid bookes of John Dus. The bookes were delinered buto the Cardinals and Bylhops, and that done,
