\*They shall Loads in Chailt of the holy Church of Bone, Cardinals, Batriarkes, Archbilhops, Bilhops, and other Piclates, & Doctours of diminitie and of both lawes in great number affembled and gathered together, this most facted & holie Councell of Constance declareth & determineth y articles aboue laid (the which after due conference had, are found in his bookes written with his owne hand, the which allo plaid John Bus in one audience her and, the which allo faid John Bus in ope audience, befoge this holy Coun= cell, bath confessed to be in his bokes) not to be Catholicke, neither worthy to be taught, but that many of them are erroncous, some of them to be wicked, othersome to be offensive buto godly eares, many of the to be temerarious and feditions, and the greater part of them to be notoxi= only bereticall, and cue now of late by pholy fathers and generall Councels, reproued a condened. And for so much as f said Articles are expressly conceined in the bookes of the laid John Bus, therefore this faid \* facred Councell, poth codemne & reproue all thole bokes which he wrote, in what forme or phrase somer they be, or whether they be traflated by others, a both determine and decree, that they all thall be folermely a openty burned in the preferre of percent appears of percent and the preferre of percent appears and the preferred of moreover for the premilles, that all his doctrine is worthy to be despised & eschewed of all faithfull Christians. And to the intent this most pernicious & wicked doctrine, may be peterly excluded & thut out of the Church, this facred Synode doth fraightly comand, that diligent inquilition be made by podimaries of the places by the eccletialicall confure, for fuch treatiles and works, and that fuch as are found, be confirmed & burned with fire. And if there be any found, which chall contemne or depile this fentence or decree, this facred Synode ordeineth and decreeth that the ordinaries of the places, and the inquilitours of berefies, that proceed against enery such person as suspect of herely. mberefore, after due inquilition made against the fayd

John Bulle, and full information had by the Commillaries and Doctours of both lawes, and allo by the faiengs of the witnelles which were worthy of credite, and many other things opely read before the faid John Bus, and before p fathers and prelates of this facred Councell (by the which allegation of the witneties it appeareth that & layb Many shall John Dus hath taught many cutll e offentine, feditious, and perilous herefies, and hath preached the same by a long time) this most sacred sholy Synode lawfully conthat deceive gregate and gathered together in the holy Bholt, the name of Chailt being inuocate & called upon, by this their fen= tence which here is fer forth in writing, determineth, pro-nounceth, declareth, & decreeth, that John Hus was and is a true and manifelt beteticke, and that he hath pleached openly errours & herelies lately condemned by the church of Bod, and many other feditious, temerarious, & offensfue things to no final offence of the Dinine matelie, and of the builderfall Church, and detriment of the Catholicke faith & Church, neglecting and despiling the keyes of the Church, & Ecclefiafticall cenfures. In the which his errours be continued with a minde altogether indurate and bardned by the space of many yeares, much offending the faithfull Chillians by his oblinacie & Auburnes, when as he made his appeale but the Loyd Ielu Chill, as the most high indge, omitting and leaving all Ecclesialicall meanes. In the which his appeale be alledged many falle, to Christ is to the popes iniurious, and offentiue matters, in contempt of the Apo-Rolicke lea, and the Eccleliafficall centures and keyes.

wherupon both for the premilles & many other things, the faid Synode pronounceth I. Bus to be an bereticke, eiudgeth him by these presents to be condemued & iud-Veritie conged as anheretike, & repionethy faid appeal as minicions, offentine, & done in devilió unto y cedefiafical invildició, e indgeth the faid Bus, not only to haucfeduced the chris ftian people by his writings & preachings, and specially in the kingdome of Boheme, neither to have beite a true preacher of the Bolpell of Chilf but o faid people, accoping to the expolition of pholy Doctours: but also to have bene a seducer of them, & also an oblimate and lifnecked person, yea and such a one as both not belive to returne a= gaine to the lappe of our holy mother the Church, neither to abince the errours and herefies which he hath openly picached and defended, wherefore this molt facred Councell decreeth and declareth that the laid John Bulle, thail be famoully deposed and disgraded from his Priestly ofders and dignitie, &c.

whilest these things were thus read, John Buss, albethe vere forbiden to speake, notwithkading he did of-LHus cleaten interrupt them, and specially whe he was reproued of sublimest oblinacie, he said with a londe voice: I was never obliof oblinary nate, but as alwaies heretoloze, eue lo now againe I de-

fire to be taught by the boly Scriptures, and I bo professe my felie to be to besirous of freuth, that if I might by one only word subuert the errours of all heretickes, I would not refule to enter into what peril or dager foeuer it were. when his bokes were condened, he laid: wherefore haue von codemned those books, when as you have not prouce by any one Article, that they are corrary to the fcriptures or Articles of faith? And moreover, what iniver is this you do to me, that you have codened theie bokes witten in the Bohemian toung, which you neuer law, neither yet read. And offerimes looking up unto heave, he prayed.

whe the fentence and judgement was ended, kneeling Hus prayeth downe bpan his knees, he faid: Lord Jelu Chrift, forgette for his enemics. mine enimies, by whome thou knowell that I am falicly accused, and that they have vscd falle witnes and flanders against me: forgene them I say, for thy great mercies fake. This his praire and oration the greater part, and specially the chiefe of the Priests did deride and mocke.

At the last, the seuen Bilhops which were chosen out to I. Hus commanbilgrade him of his prichbod, commanded him to put on the priche garthe garments pertaining onto pricsthood, which thying when he had done, butili he came to the putting on of the Albe, he called to his remembraunce the white velluce which Berode put opon Jelus Christ to mock him withall. So likewife in al other things he did comfort himselfe by the example of Chrift. when he had now put on all his priefly belluces, the Bilhops exhorted him that he fould et alter and change his minde and purpole, and prouide for his honour and lafegard. Then he (according as i ma= ner of the ceremony is going by to the top of the feaffoid, being full of teares, her spake buto the people in this fort.

These Lords and Bishops do exhort and councell mee, that I

should heere confesse before you all that I have erred, the which

thing to do, if it were such as might be done with the infamy and reproch of anyeman, they might peraduenture easily perswade me therunto: but now truly I am in the fight of the lord my God, without whose great ignominy, and grudge of mine owne con-science, I can by no meanes do that which they require of mee. For I doo well knowe, that I neuer taught any of those thinges I. Hus his oratiwhich they have falfly alledged against mee, but I have alwayes on voto the preached, taught, written, and thought contrary thereunto. With what countenance then should I behold the heauens? with what people. face should I looke vpon them, whome I have taught, whereof there is a great number, if thorough me it should come to passe that those things which they have betherto knowne to bee most certaine and fure, should now be made vncertaine? Should I by this my example aftonish or trouble so manye soules, so manye consciences, endewed with the most firme and certaine knowledge of the Scriptures, and Gospell of our Lord Iesu Christ and his most pure doctrine, armed against all the affaults of Satan > I will neuer do it, neither commit any such kinde of offence, that I shoulde seeme more to esteeme this vile carcas appoynted vnto death, then their health and faluation. At this most godly worde he was forced againe to heare by the consent of the Bishops, that

hee did obstinately and maliciously perseuere in his pernicious

and wicked errours.

The difgrading of Ioan Hus.

Then he was commanded to come downe to the execus tion of his indgement, and in his comming downe, one of the featen Billops afore redearled, firste twe awaye the chalice from him which he helde in his hand, sairing: D curso Judas, why has thou torsake the countel a wairs of veace, and half counsailed with the Jewes ? we take a= way fro thee this chalice of thy faluation. But John Bus received this curse in this maner: but I trust onto God the father omnipotent, and my Lorde Jelus Christ, for whose sake I do suffer these things, that hee will not take away the chalice of his redemption, but have a ftedfait and firme hope that this day I hall drinke thereof in his kingdome. Then followed the other Bishops in order, which enery one of them toke away the voluments from him, which they had put on, ethe one of them gening hym their curie. Whereunto John Hus answered, that hee did willingly embrace and beare those blasphemies for the name of the Lord Jelus Chill. At the last they came to the rating of his shauen crowne. But before the Bishops would go in hand with it, there was a great contention betweene them, with what inftrument if thould be bone, with a ratour, or with a paire of theares.
