But before they did that, there yet remained another knacke of reproch. For they cauled to be made a certaine crowne of paper, almost a cu= bite beepe, in the which were painted three deuils of wonderfuil ougly chape, and this title fet ouer their heads, Herefiarcha. The which when he law, he layde: By Lord Iclus Chailt for my lake did weare a crowne of thome: why floudd not I then for his take agains weare thys light crowne, be it never to ignominious : Truly I will boit, and that willingly, when it was let upon his head, the Bithops faide: now we commit thy foule unto the deuill. But I, fayde John Bulle (lifting his eies op towardes the heatens) do commit my spirite into the handes: D Lord Icin Chist, buto the I commend my fpirit which thou halt reocemed. Thele contumelious op= problies thus ended, the Bilhops turning themselves towards the Emperour, said: This most faced Synode of Constance, leaveth now John Bulle, which bath no more any office, or to bo in the Church of Bod, wnto the civill indocement and power. Then the Emperour commaunded Lodonicus Duke of Banaria, which flode be-fore him in his vobes holding the golden apple with the croffe in his hande, that he thould receive John Buffe of the Bylhops, and deliner him buto them which hould do the execution. By whome, as her was led to the place of execution, before the Church dozes hee lawe his bokes hereat bee finiled and laughed. And all men that he palled by, he exhaused, not to thinke that he thould bye for any errour or herelie, but only for the hatred and ill will of his advertacies, which had charged him with most falle and viniust crine. All the whole Litie in a maner being in armour, followed him.

The place appointed for the execution, was before the gate Botlebian, berweene the garbens and the gates of the suburbs. when as John Hulle was come thether, kneeling downe byon his knees, and lifting his cies by buto beauen, he plaied, and faide certaine plaimes, and specially the so, and 31, Plalmes. And they which stode

by heard him oftentimes in his plaier, with a merrie and chearefull countenance repeate this verse: Into thy hands, O Lord, I commend my spirit, &c. which thing when the lay people beheld which frod nert buto hun, they laid: what he hath done afore, wee knowe not, but now weefee and heare that hee both speake and play very denoutely and godly. Otherfome wilhed that he had a Confestor. There was a certaine Priest by, litting on horsebacke in a greens gowne drawne about with red sike, which said, he ought not to be heard, because he is an hereticke. Yet notwithflanding whilest he was in prison, he was both confessed. and also absolued by a certaine Doctour, a Monke, as Bus himselfe doth witnes in a certaine Epiffle which he wrote buto his frendes out of prilon. Thus Chrift raigneth buknowne buto the world, even in middelt of his enimies. In the meane time whilest he praied, as he bows ed his necke backward to loke vpward buto heanen, the crowne of paper fell off from his head upon the grounde. Then one of the fouldiours taking it by againe, faid : let bs put it agains boon his head, that he may bee burned with his maillers the diucls whome he hath lerued.

when as by the commandement of the togmentours, he was rifen up fro the place of his praier, with a loud voice be faide: Lord Jefu Christ allist and belp me, that with a conflant and pacient mind, by thy most gracious helpe, 3 may be are a luffer this cruel a ignominious death, where unto I am condemned for the preaching of the most bolie Bolpel and word.
