fore you all, that I do beleene and holde the articles of the fayth, as the holy Catholicke Church both hold and beleue the same: but so, this cause thall I now be condemned, for that I will not confent with you onto the condemnation of those most holy and blessed men asozesayd, whome you bane most wickedly condemned for certaine articles, dete= teffing and abhorring your wicked and abhominable life. Then he confessed there before them all his beliefe, and be tered many thinges very profoundly and cloquently, in fo much that all men there present, could not sufficiently co= mend & prayle bys great cloquece & excellent learning and by no means could they induce of perfwade him to recant.

Then a certagne bilhop named the Bilhop of Landy made a certagne fermon erhortative agagnit 29. Dierome

perswading to his condemnation.

After the Bylhop had ended the layd fermon, M. Dies rome layd agayn buto them: You thall condemne me wickedly and buiuftly. But Jafter my death will leaue a remogle in your conscience, and a nayle in your hartes, ET CITO VOS OMNES, VT RESPONDEATIS MIHI CORAM ALTISSIMO ET IVSTISSIMO IVDICE POST CEN-TYM ANNOS: that is. And here I cite you to auniwere unto me befoze the most high and inft Judge , within a L.

Ropenne can lufficiently write or note thole thinges which he most eloquently, profoundly, & Philosophically had spoken in the says audience, neither can anye tongue sufficently declare § same, wheerfore I have but onely conched here the superficial matter of his talke, partly, & not wholly noting the lame, finaly, when as by no meanes be might be pertwaded to recant the premilles, immediately cuen in hispelence, the fentence & indgement of hys concondemnation was genen against him, & read befoze him.

The fentence read against M. Hierome.

IR the name of Bod Amen. Christ our Bod and our Sautour being the true byne , whole father is the hulband= man, taught hys Disciples and all other faythful men, fay= ing: If anyma owel not imme, let him be call out as a bow or braunch, elet him wither and dry. ec. The doctrine and preceptes of which most excellent doctor and mayfter, this most facted Synode of Constance, executing & following in the cause of inquisition agaynst hereticks, being mouco by this faid facred Sinode, through report, publiche fame, and open infamation : proceedeth agaynft Bierome of 19rage, Mayfter of Arte, lay man. By the Actes & proces les of whole caule it appeareth that the layd mayiter Bie= rome hath holde, mayntagned, and taught divers Articles

bereticall and erroneous, lately reproued and condemned by the holy fathers, some being very blasphemous, other fome offeding godly cares, & many temerarious & Couis ous which have bene affirmed, mayntagned, preached and taught by the men of most damnable memory I. wicklesse & John Dus, the which are also written in divers of their workes & books. which articles of doctrine and books of the layd John Dus and wickleffe together with their memory, and the person of the layd John Bus, were by the layd sacred Syriode condemned of herefie. The which sentence of condemnation this Dierome afterward during & time of inquilition, acknowledged in the layd lacred Symode, approuce the true Latholicke & Apollolicke faith, thereunto consenting, accurling all herefie, specially that whereof he was ensamed, a consessed hunsels to be infamed e that which in times pall I. Bus & I. wicklesse maintained e taught in their works, sermos e books: sor y which the layd wickleffe & Bus together with they, doctrine and ctrois, were by the layd lacted Synobe as hereticall, conseemned. The condemnatios of all which the premites, he did openly professe and allow, and did sweare that he wold perseuere and continue in the vertice of that fayth. And if that he fhold prefume at any time to hold opinio or preach contrary thereunto, that he would submitte himselfe to the triall and truth of the Lanons, and be bound to perpenual punishment. And this his profession writte with his own hand, he delivered up into the holy Councell. Many dates after hysiand protellion and admiration, as a dogge returning but obys domite, to y intent he might openly domit up the most pession to prove had long lurked and laten hid in his breft, he required and defired that he might be openly heard before the Councell. The whiche being graunted unto him, he affirmed, layd and profelled before the whole Synode, being publickely gathered together, y he had wickedly consented and agreed to the sentence endgement of the condemnation of the laid wickest and Bus, and that he had most thamefully lyed in approung and allowing the layd lentece, neyther was he alhamed to confesse that he had lyed: yea he did also renoke and recant his confession, approbation and protestation, which he had made vpon their condemnation, affirming that he neuer at any tyme had read any errours or herefie in the bookes & creatiles of the faid wickleffe and Bus. Albeit he had be= fore confessed it, and it is enidently proved that he did dilligently fludy, read and pleache their bookes, wherein it is manifelt that they are contayned many erroures and he-relies.
