rough and buknowne, his enunies were on holfebacke, and all his fouldiours on forte, neither could there be any battaile fought, but on fote. Whereupon, when his enethe women which cultomably followed the hoft, to cast their kerchiesses upon the ground, wherein the hossemen being entangled by their spurres, were flaine before they could valote their feete.

After this, he went buto Aulca, a towne situate bpou the River Lulimitius, out of which cowne 1920copius and Wiricins, two biethien papills, had callout many protestancs. This Towns Jisca twice by force of arms the tivit night of Lent, rated it, and let it on fire. De also twhe the Calife of Litius, which was a mile off, whether as Ulricius was fled; and put Wiricius and all his familie

to the fwold, faving one only.

Then, forfomuch as he had no walled or fensed towne to inhabite, he chose out accreaine place upon the same riuer, which was fenfed by nature, about eight miles from the Citie of Aulca. This place he copalled in with walles, Thabor builded. and commaunded every man to build them boules, where they had pitched their tents, and named this Lity Thaboy, and the inhabitants his companions Thaborites; bi= cause their Citic, by all like, was builded upon the top of somehill or mount. This Citic, albeit that it was sensed with high rockes and cleanes, yet was it compated with a wall and vaunure, and the river Lufinitius fenfeth a great part of the towne, the rest is compassed in with a great broke; the which running fraight into the river Lucinitius, is flopped by a great rocke, and driven backe towards the right hand, all the length of the Litie, and at the further end it ioineth with the great river. The way buto it by land is scarle thirtic force broade; for it is almost an Iland. In this place there was a deepe dich call, and a triple wall made, of such thicknes, y it could not be broken with any engine. The wall was full of towers a forts fet in their couenient a meete places. Filea was the firste that builded the Caftle, and those that came after him, fortified it, enery manaccooling to his owne denile. At that time the Thaboutes had no horsemen amongst them, until fuch time as Micholas, mailter of pmint (whom the Emperour had fent into Bohemia with a M. horfemen to fet things in order, & to withstand the Thaborites lodging all night in a village named Clogise) was lurprifed by Silta comming vpon him fodenly in y night, taking away all his hogle and armour, a ferting fire byon the village. Then Alica taught his fouldiours to mount on hogleback, , to runne, to turne, to call in a ring, lo that after

this hencuer led army without his wings of horsemen.

In this meane time Sigilmundus the Emperour gas thering together, p nobles of Blelia, entred into Bobeme, and went unto Brecium, and fro thence with a great army buto Luthua; alluring Leucho with many great and large promiles, to render by Caffle of Prage buto him, and there placed himfelfe to annoy the towne. Thus Cencho infamed with double treason, returned home. The Citizens of Prage lent for Filea, who speding himselfe the ther with the Thaborites, received the citic buder his gonernance. In the Bohemias hoft there was but only two Barons, Hilco Cruffina of Lituburge, and Hilco of wal-deficie, with a few other nobles. All the religie were of p common people. They went about first to subdue the Cafiell, which was by nature very frongly fensed, and could not be won by no other meanes than with famine: where upon ally passages were stopped, that no vittailes should be carried in. But the Emperour opened the pallages by bint of fword; when he had genen into them which were belieged, all things necessary, having sente for appeal of the Empire, he determined thoushy after to beliege the Litie. There was in the Emperours campe the Dukes of Saron, the Marqueles of Brandenburge, and hys fonne in law Albert of Antirich. The Citie was affaulted by the fpace of bi. weekes. The Emperor Sigilinud was crow= ned in the Metropolitane house in the Castle, Conradus the Archbishop solemnising the ceremonies of the cozona= tion. The city was fleaightly belieged. In the meane time the Captaines Rolenles & Chragery, which had take the tentes of the Thaborites, being ouercome in lattaile by Nicholas Bulle, whome Files had fent with parte of hys power for that purpole, were driven out of their tentes, and Bretium the Queenes Citie was also taken

There is also about the Towns of Prage a high hill, which is called Widechon. On this hill had Jilca frongly planted a garrilon, that his enemies thould not pollette it; with whome the Marques of Milnia fkirmilling, loft a great part of his fouldiours. For when as the Milnians had gotten the top of the hill, being driven back into a cozner, which was broken a fleepe, and fierly fee upon, who as they could no longer withfrad the violent force of their enimics, some of them were flaine, and some falling head= long from the hill, were destroyed. whereupon the Empe= rour Sigilmund railing his feege, departed buto Cuthna and Fisca with his company departed buto Thaboz, and subdued many places: amogit which he subucrted a town pertaining to the captaine of Wilgrade. During this tyme the Castellof Allgrade was strongly belieged, whereas, when other vittailes wated, they were compelled to eate horse fielh. Last of all, except the Emperour did aide them by a certaine daye, they promited to yeld it by; but buder this condition, that if the Emperour did come, they within the Calife thould be no more moletted.

The Emperour was present before the day; but becyng The Empeignorant of the truce taken, entring into a straight bnocr= neath the Calile, was lodenly fer opon by the fouldiours of Prage, where he had a great ouerthrow, and fo leaving his purpole unperformed, returned backe againe. There were flaine in that conflict ring, noble men of the Morani= ans, and of the Bungarians, tother a great number. The Lattle was delivered up unto them, whilest these things were in boing, Inca toke Bollans a captaine, which was furnamed Lignous, by force, in a very strog cowne of his, and brought him buto his religion, who a few yeares after, leading the processants host in Austria, was wonnded before Rhetium, and died. Ther were in the territoric The Abbeis of Pellina many monasteries, of p which Fisca subverted and burned five. And followinch as p monastery of Saint Clare was the ftrongest, there he putched himselfe.

Thether also came the Emperour with his army : but Zisca putwhen Zilca brought forth his poweragainst him, be most teil the Emcowardly fled, and not log after, he departed and left 180= heme. Then Inca went with his army unto pelzina:but hight. forlomuch as hee lawe the Litic lo fenced, that hee was in boubt of winning the fame, he went from thence to Lom= mitauia a famous Litie, the which he toke by force, bur= ning all the Priefts therein.

Afterward, when as he lay before the towne of Raby, and froughy bedieged the same, he was fricken with a that in the eye, having but that one before to fee withall. From thence, hee was carried to Plage to Philicians, whereas he being cured of his wound, and his life laucd, yet he lost his light, and for all that, he woulde not forlake

his army, but fill toke the charge of them.

After this, the garrifons of Prage went onto Warona, where as there was a great gardon of the Emperours, & toke it by force, many being flaine of eyther parte. They also twhe the towne of Broda in Bermany, and fine the garrifon, and afterward toke Cuthna and many other cities by composition. Further, when as they leade they army buto a town called Pous, which is inhabited by the Milnians; the Sarous meeting the by the way, because retire. they durif not ioine battaile, they returned backe. After all this, y Emperour appointed the Princes electours a day, that at Barrilmewride, they thould with their armie rour with immade the wealt part of Boheme, and he with an holt of his power Bungarians would enter on the Cast part. There came entreth aunto his apoc the Archbilhop of Meutz, the countic Pallatine of Uheme, the Dukes of Saron, the Marques of Brandenburge, & many other Bilhops out of Almaine: all the rest sente their aydes. They encamped before the towne of Sozius, a frong & well fenced place, which they could be no meanes subdue. The countrey was spoiled walled round about, and the frege continued butilly fealt of S. Balle. Then it was broken up because the Empe= tour was not come at his day appointed; but he hauping gathered together a great army of the Bungarians, and Well Mozauians, about Christinas entred into Bobeme, and twhe certaine townes by force, and Luthna was yel-bed buto him. But when Jisca (although he was blinde) came towardes him, and fet boon him; he being afeard, & many of his nobles flaine, fled. But first he burned Cuthna, which the Thabopites, by meanes of the filuer mines, called the powerh of Antichaift. Fisca pursujug the Emperour a dayes tourney, not great & rich sporte, and taking the rowne of Broda by force, let it ou fire the which afterward almost by the space of rish, yeares, remained bilinhabited. The Emperour palled by abridge oner the riner of Iglaria. And Pilo a Flozentine, which had brought ctory of Zilrb. 29. hopsemen out of Bungary to these warres, palied ca. oucrete Ale; the which by the multitude a number of his horlemen being broke, deuoured & bestroied a great num= ber. Filea having obteined this dictory, would not fuffer any image or idoll to be in the Churches, neither thought it to be borne withall, that Priests shoulde minister with copes of velliments: for the which cause be was much the
