The king dinorced from Lady Catherine & fro the Pope, both at one tyme.

Anno 1533 Queene Anne crowned. Queene Elizabeth borne.

These other thus being recited and opened to the people, were the occasion that the Pope lost al his interest and invildiction beere in Englande, wythin flore while after. Chon the occalion and reason whereof, the matter falling out more & more against the Pope, Syr Thomas More, of whome mention is made before, being a great maintainer of the Pope, & a heavy troubler of Chilles people, and now not liking well of this othe, by Gods god worke, was enforced to religne by his Chauncelorflip, and to de= liner by the great leale of England into the kings hands. After whom inceeded by Thomas Andley, Beeper of the areat leale, a man in cloquence and giftes of tonge no lelle incomparable, then also for hys godly dilpoled minde, and fauozable inclination to Christes religio, worthy of much commendation.

These things being done in the parlament, the king wi= in those time after, proceeded to the mariage of the forefave lady Anne Bullen, mother to our mou noble Quene now, who wout all controversie was a special comforter a aider of all the proteffors of Christes gospell, as well of the learsted as the bulearned ther life bring also directed according to the same, as her weekely almes did manifestly declare: who belides the ordinarye of a C. crownes, and other ap= parell that the gave weekely a yeare before the was crowmed, both to men and women, gave also wonderfull much privite almes to by dowes and other pore houlholders co= timually til fice was apprehended, and the ener gaue three or four e pounde at a time to the poic people, to buy them kine withall, and fent her bubainner to the townes about where thee lay, that the parithioners frould make a bill of all the pore householders in their parish, and some towns received 7.8.02 10. pound to buy kine withall according as the number of the pope in the Townes were. Shee also maintained many learned me in Cambridge, Likewife did the Erle of willhire her father, and the Lord Bochford her brother, and by them these men were brought in fauour w the king: of whome some are yet aline and can testifie the same, which would to God they were nowe as great pro= fellors of the gospell of Christ, as then they appeared to be. which were D. Beath, and D. Thirlby: with whome was toyned the L. Paget, who at that prefent was an earneft protestant, gane onto one Rainolde west, Luthers bokes, and other bokes of the Bermaines, as Franciscus Lambertus de Sectis, and at that time he red Egelancthous Inhe= torike openly in Trinitie hall in Cambridge, and was w his M. Bardinera mainetaince of D. Barnes and all the Protestances that were then in Cambridge, & holpe many religious persons out of their cowles.

It hath bene reported buto be by diners credible perfons which were about this Quene, and daily acquainted with her doings concerning her liberall and bountiful di-Aribution to the poze, how her grace caried ener about her a certaine little purse, out of the which the was wont daily to featter abroad some almes to the needy; thinking no day well spent, wherein some man had not fared the better by some benefite at her handes. And this I write by the relation of certain noble personages which were chiefe & principall of her waiting maides about her, especially the Du= ches of Richmond by name.

Allo concerning the order of her ladies & gentlewomen about hee, one that was her littivoman, a Bentlewoman not nowealine, but of great credite and also of fame for her worthy doings, did credibly report, that in all her time the meuerlaw better order amongst the ladies & gentlewome of the Courte, then was in this good Queenes dayes, who kepte her maides and luche as were about her to occupyed in fowing and working of thirts & finockes for the pore, that neither was there sene any idlenes then amogst them, not any leifure to followe fuch pattimes as daily are feene now a daies to raigne in princes courtes.

Thus the king being denozeed from the lady Downard his brothers wife, maried this gracious Lady, making a prosperous and happy change for vs. being dinorced from the foresaide Princesse and also from the spope both at one time. Activethilanding as good and godly purpoles are ueuer without some incommoditie of trouble following, so it happened in this disorcement that the saybe princess procuring from Rome the Popes curle, caused both the King and the realme to be interdited, wherof moze is here= after to be fooken.

In the meane time Quene Anne, thorthy after ber ma= riage, being great with childe, the next yeare followinge, which was 1523, after the first dinoscement publikely proclaimed, was crowned with high folemnitie at wellmin-Aer: and not long after her Cozonation, the 7. day of September the was brought a bed, and belivered of afaire La= dy, for whose god delineraunce Te Deum was songe in all places, and great preparation made for the Christening.

The Maior and his brethren with 40. of the chiefe Ci= tizens were commanned to be present withall the nobles and Bentlemen. The kings pallace and all the wals betweene that and the Friers, was hanged with Arras, and the Friers Churche. Allo the Fente was of liluer, & Awde in the midft of the Churche thice fleppes high, which was conered with a fine cloth, and diners Bentlemen with approximation towels about their neckes, gave attendance as bout it. Duer the Fonte hong a faire Canapy of crimoline Hatten fringed with Bolde. About it was a raile couered wyth faic. Betweene the Quire and the body of the church was a close place with a pan of fire to make the childe reas dy in. Thele things thus ordered, the childe was brought into the Hall, and then enery man let forward. First the ciatizens 2. and 2. Then the gentlemen, Elquiers and Chapleins. Pert after folowed the Aldermen and the Maio: a= lone. Mert the Maior followed the kings Councell. Theu the kings Chappel. Then Barons, Bilhops and Earles. Then came the Earl of Elick, bearing the courted Balons guice. After him the Marques of Exerci wyth the taper of Mirgin ware. Rert him, the Marques Doulet bearynge the Salte. Behinde him the Ladie Marie of Rotthfolke bearing the Chillome which was very riche of perie and fone. The olde Duchelle of Rozthfolke bare the childe in a Mantle of Purple Weluette, with a longe traine Furred with Ermine. The Duke of Morthfolke with hys War= thal rod, went on the right hand of the layde Duchelle, and the Duke of Suffolke on the left hande. Befoze them went the Officers of armes. The Countelle of Bente bare the long traine of the childes mantell. Berwene the Countelle and the child, went the Erle of willhire on the right hand, and the Erle of Darby on the left hand, supporting the faid traine. In the middest over the childe was borne a Lanapie by the Lord Rochford, the Lord Huffey, the Lord wil-liam Haward, and the Lord Thomas Hawarde the cloer. In this order they came buto the Churche doze where the Bilhop of London mette it, with divers Abbots and By-Mops, and beganthe observances of the Sacrament. The Archbilhop of Caunterbury was Bodfather, and the olde Duchelle of Porthfolke, and the old Marchionelle of Dozfet, widowes, were Bodmothers, and the childe was namen Flizabeth

After all thinges were done at the Churche dooze, the thild was brought to the Fonte & Christened. This done. Cranmer Barter the chiefe king ofarmes cryed aloud: God of his ingodfather finite goodnes send prosperous lyse and longe, to the high and mighty princesse of England, ELIZABETH. Then the Trom-Elixabeth. pettes blew, and the childe was brought vp to the aultare and immediately confirmed by the Archbilhop, the Marchionelle of Exceter beyng Bodinother. Then the Archbi= thop of Caunterbury gave to the Princelle a flanding cup of Bold. The Duchelle of Roschfolke gaue to ber a francing cup of Bolde, frested with Pearle. The Marchionelle of Dozlet, three gitte boles pounced, with a couer. The Warchionelle of Execter, three finding boles gift & grauen with a couer. And fo after a folemne bancket ended with Ipocras, waters, and such lyke in great plenty, they returned in like order agapue buto the Courte, with the

Princelle, and to departed. At the Maryage of this noble Lady, as there was no finall toy buto al good and gooly men, and no lefte hope of profecous fucceffe to Bods truc Beligion, fo in like maner on the contrarge parte, the papifica wanted not they? malicious and fecret attemptes, as by the falle hipocrific and fayned holynelle of a falle fayned hipocrite this yeare before cloved a found out, may fufficiently appeare what they, deutifihe deutles and purpoles were. For certayne Monks Friers, aother cuill disposed perios, of a deutifih intent, had put into the heades of many of the kinges inb= iectes, that they had reuclation of Bod and hys fayntes, y he was highly displeased wiking Henry, fory dinosec-ment of the Lady Katherine, and surmised amongst other thyngs, that Bod had reucaled to a Runne, named Elizabeth Barton, whome they called the holy maide of Bente, that in cale the Kinge proceeded in the fayde denorce, bee fhould not be king of this realme, one monethafter, and in of Kent the reputation of Bod, not one day not hour. This Elizabeth Barton by fall diffimulation practiled and thewed to falle fained the people, maruellous alteration of her vilage and other Mpocrifie partes of her body, as if the had bene rapt or in a traunce, apprehededin those fained traunces by falle hipocrific (as though thee had bene inspired of Bod) the spake many words in rebuking offinue, and reproving the Bolpell whiche flee cal-led herefic, and among them bettered divers though to the great reproch of the king and Quene, & to the chablithing eoly 2008 to distance and the derogation of Boos glory: whych her naughtines being spied out by the great las bour and diligence of the Archbilhop of Caunterbury, the Lozd
