6 Item, that your layd Bylhop, as wel in the kings ma= teffics late vilitation win your Diocelle, as at londivother times, have ben complained byon, & funding informations made against you for your doings, sayings & preachings against fundry Aniunctions, orders and other procedings of his maichie let fouth for reformation of errors, superfic

tions and other abules in religion.

Item, that after and opposithe occasion of those & other many complaints and informations, you have ben fundry times admonished, commanded and enjoyeed to conforme

your felfe, as to your ductic appertameth.

8 Item, that after the premilles, and for that those former admonitions & commaundements notwythstanding, you did yet Bill thewe your felfe not conformable, & forthat allo by your example the people were much animated, a therby occasion of muche buquietnesse ministred, you were called before the kings maiestics counsell in the moneth of June, the 2. yeare of his maichtes raigne, & by them on his high-nes behalfe commanuded to pleache a Sermon before hys maichie, and therm to declare the tulines and godlines of his Maichies father and his proceedings oppon certaine matters partly mentioned in certaine articles to you delinered in wigting, and partly otherwife declared buto you. The effecte whereof, was touching the vlurped authoritye of the B. of Rome, and that his pretented authoritie was fully a godly taken away in this realm, a other the kings maiesties dominions: Touching the first suppression and taking away of Monasteries, Religious houses, wildrimages, Keliques, Shunes and Images, the superlitious going about of S. Richolas billiop, S. Edmund, S. Katherin, S. Clement and such like, for taking away of Chatreis, Obites and Colleges, touching hallowing of Candels, water, aftes, palme, holy breade, beades, creeping to the croffe and luche like: touching the letting fourthe of the kings maiefties authoritie in his yog yeres to be as great, as if his highnelle were of many more yeres, touching auricular confession, touching the procession & common prais er in Englishe, and that things done in generall Councels against the worde of Bod, may be instly renoked in particular Councels.

Item, that you receiving the same, and promiting to de= clare them in a fermone by you made before his Maiestie for that purpole, on the feast of \$. Peter in the sayd second yere of his highnelle raigne, did then and there contemptuoully and disobediently omit to declare and fet fouth many of the fayd matters to the great contempt of his Maichie,

and daungerous crample of others. 10 Item, that you being allo commanded, and orthis ma=

ieffics behalf, for the anoyding offumult, & for other great confiderations inhibited to treate of any matter in controuerlie concerning the Malle of the communion (then commonly called the Sacrament of the aultar) did contrary to the layd commandement & inhibition, declare divers your judgements & opinions in the lame, in manifelt contempt of hys Maichies layd inhibition, to the great offence of the hearers, and diffurbaunce of the common quiet, and buity of the realme.

12 Item, that after that, videlicef the s day of Auty, in the fourth years of his Maielties raigue, his highnes lent onto you bys graces tetters, with a certaine fubmillion and articles, whereunto hys grace willed and commanded you to subscribe, to the whyche submission you contempriously

refused to subscribe.

Item, that you having efflones tertaine of the byings most honorable Connecil fent onto you the 12. of Julye, in the layd fourth years, with the fame fribmillion, and beyng inflification in his maichtes behalfe required and commanded to conlider agains better the layd submission and to subscribe the same, flode in julification of your leffe, and woulde in no wile lubicribe thereunto.

Item, that after all thes, the 14. nave of Julye, in the layde fourth years, the layd kings Matellic fent yet agains which you certains of his maichies most honogable councel with an other submission and divers other arricles, willing and commanding you to lubicely evolution thereunts, whych to do you viterly refuted.

15 Item, that after all thys, videlicet the 19.0f Julye in the lapde fourth yeare, you being personally called before the whole counsaile, and having the sayde submission and articles openly and diffinctly read unto you, and required to one of wyne subscribe the same, excluded for untuit and santastical consisterations by you affect ged, to subscribe the same.

After these arricles were exhibited buto him, and he hav uing leave to lay for himfelf, whethin he bled at the cautels, Wiften and remedies of the law to his most advantage, by way of protesting, reculing and excepting against the come million, and requiring allo the copies as well of the Articles, as of his protestation of the Actuaries (which wer w. Say and Tho. Argall) time and respite was alligned wito hym to auniwer to the layd Articles in wyrting. But he lo cauilled and dalied from day to day, to answer directly, al= though he was sufficiently laboured and perswaded to the same by sondry callinger and Actes, and also aboundantly connicted by depolitions and witnelles, especially by matter induced by the L. Paget, and Andrewe Beynton, & M. Chalenoz, pag. 816. (all which I referre to my first boke) that at the last he appealed from them, reputing them not to be competent and indifferent indges to heave and determine his caule, onto the kings royal person: notwithstan= ding by protestation alwaies reserving to himselfe the benefite of his appellation: And so proceded he to the answering of the forelaid articles, but in such crafty and obstinate maner, as before he had ben accustomed, and as at large to Monumete. them that be delirous to understand the processe thereof, in the first boke of the Actes and monuments of the Church aforefayd may appeare.

But briefly to conclude, such exceptions he vied against the witnelles produced against him, and he himself produc ced fuch a number of witheffes in bys defence, and bled fo many delaies and cavillations, that in the end the commislioners feeing his flubbernelle, proceeded to the femence definitine against him, as heere buder followeth.
