A Bout the same yeare and time, when Doct. Bonevict soouth this prescript or monitory, there came from the Quene another proclamation against straungers and for= remers within this realme. The purpole & intent of which proclamation, because it chiefly and most specially concerned religion and doctrine, and the true professors thereof, I thought here to annexe the tenoz and maner of the same.

HE Queene our soueraigne Lady vnderstanding that a multitude of euill disposed persons, being borne out of her highnes dominions in other fondry nations, flyeng from the obeyfaunce of the Princes and Rulers under whome they be borne, some for herefie, some for murther, treason, robbery, and some for other horrible crimes, be reforted into this her maieilies Realme, and heere have made theyr demour, and yet be commoraunt and lingring, partly to eschew such conding punishment as their said horrible crimes deserue, and partly to dilate, plant, and sowe the feedes of their malicious doctrine and lewd conversation among the good subjectes of this her said Realme, of purpose to infect her good subjectes with the like, in so much as (besides innumerable herefies, which divers of the same beeing heretickes have preached and taught within her highnes fayd Realme) it is affuredly knowne vnto her Majeffy, that not only their fecret practiles haue not fayled to stirre, comfort and ayde dyuers her highnes subjectes to this most vinaturall rebellion against God and her grace, but also some other of them desist not still to practise with her people estsoones to rebell, her Maiestie therefore having (as afore is layd) knowledge and intelligence heereof, hath for remedie heerein determined, and most straightly chargeth and commaundeth, that all and every fuch person or persons borne out ofher highnes dominions, now commordant or resident within this Realine, of what locuer Nation or Countrey, beeing eyther Preacher, Printer, Bookeseller, or other Artificer, or of whatsoeuer calling elfe, not being Denizen or Marchant knowne, vfing the trade of Marchaundize, or feruant to fuch Ambaffadours as be liegers heere from the Princes and there soyifed in league with her grace, fight within 24 days after this Proclamation, anoyde the Realme, whon payme of most greedous punishment by enprisonment sild hyphyture and conflication of all their goodes and mouteables, and also to be delyuered with their naturall Princes. or Rulers, agayiff whiofe persons or lawes they have offended. Geuing to all Mayors, Sheriffes, Bryliffes, Constables, and all other her ministers, officers, and good subjectes, straightly also in charge, if they knowe any such person not borne in the Queenes highnes dominions (except before excepted) that shall after the time and day limitted in this Proclamation, tarry within thys Realme, that they shall apprehende the same person or persons, and commit him or them to warde, there to remayne without bayle or may neprife, till her graces pleasure or her Counsayles be signified vito them for the further ordering of the sayde perfon or persons. And that if any of her sayde officers, after the sayd 24. dayes apprehend, take, or knowe of any such, they shall with diligence immediatly certification sayd Counsell thereof, to the intent order may forthwith be gene for their punishmet according.

Pet. Martir and Iohannes Alafco, banished the realme.

Englishmen fled out of the realm for religion. The number of English exiles well neare 800. perfons. March 15. Lady Elizabeth and Lord Courtney spon fulpicion of Syr Thom Wyats rifing commit-Tower.

In the meant while, upo the Proclamation before men= cioned, not only p ftrangers in B. Cowards time received into the Realine for Religion, ainog who was per, war-ft, John Alako buck to the King of Poleland, but many Englishmen fled, some to Freekeland, some to Cleveland, some to high Germany, where they were dinerly scattes red into divers companies a congregations, at welell, at Frankford, Emden, Markpurgh, Hraulborough, Bafill, Arow, Jurich, Beneua, and other places: where by the promoence of Bod they were al fulleined, and there entertained with greater favour among firangers abroad, their they could be in their owne countrey at home, welneare to

the number of 800, persons, Students, & other together. In the laide moneth of Warch, the Lorde Couriney Barle of Denonchire, whome the Queene at her first entring delinered out of the Tower, and Lady Elizabeth al= so the Queenes Sister, were both in suspection to have consented to wiats conspiracie, and for the same this

March were apprehended and committed to the Tower. Touching the imprisonment of which Lady Elizabeth and the Lord Courtney, thou thait note heere for thy lear= ming (good Beader) a politicke point of practile in Steuen Baromer Bilhop of wint not buworthy to be confidered. This Bardiuce being alwayes a capitall enemic to the Lady Elizabeth, and thinking nowe by the occasion of mailter wyate to picke out some matter against the Lorde Courtney, and fo in the end, to entangle the Lady Eliza= beth, denifed a pestilent practise of conneyance, as in the flory beere following may appeare.

The flory is this. The same day that Sir Tho. wyate died, he desired the Lieutenant to hing him to the presence of the Lord Courney, who there before the Lieutenaunte and the Sheriffes, kneeling downe bpon his knees, befought the Lorde Courtney to forgene him, for that be had failly accused both the Lady Elizabeth and him, and so bes lizabeth. ing brought from thence onto the scassold to suffer, there openly in the hearing of all the people cleared the Lady Es lizabeth, and the Lorde Courtney to be free and innocente from all suspicion of that commotion. At which confession, D. Weston Doctor welfon there flanding by, cryed to the people, faying: Beleene him not good people, for he confessed other=

wile before vnto the Counfell.

After the execution done of Sir Thomas wyat, which was the ii. day of Aprill, word was brought immediately to the Lord Maior Sir Thomas white, a little before dinner, how maister wyate had cleared the Lady Elizabeth and Lorde Courtney, and the wordes also which Doctor weston spake unto the people, whereant othe Lord Major aunswering: Is this true quoth he ? said weston so : In forth I never toke him otherwife but for a knaue. Upon this, the Lord Maior litting downe to dinner (who byned the same day at the Bridgehouse) commeth in Sir Martin Bowes with the Recorder, newly come from the Parliament house, who heaving of the Maior and Sheriffes this report of wiats concession, both upon the Scattold and alfo in the Tower, marueiled thereat, declaring how there was another tale contrary to this, told the same day in the Parliament house, which was, that Sir Thomas wyate thould defire the Lord Courtney to confesse the truth, so as he had done before.

Tipon this it followed not log after that a certaine prentice dwelling in S. Laurence lane, named Cut, as he was drinking with one Denha a platterer being one of Quent Maries lernaunts, amongit other talke made mentio how Sir Thomas wyate had cleared the Lady Elizabeth and the Lord Courtney, to be no colenters to his viling, which wordes being brought to Bardiner (by what meanes I know not) incorneut voon the fame, Syr Andrew Judde was fent by the fayo Bilhopto y Lord Maior, commannding him to bring the faid prentife to the Star Chamber, which was acculed of these words, that he thould say that was confirmined by the Counfell to accuse the Lady Elizabeth and the Lord Courtney, which fellow when he was some to the flarre Chamber, the aforesaid Bardiner lecting palle other matters that were in hand, began to declare to the whole multitude, how ingraculoully almighty Bod had brought the Queenes Maichy to the Crowne. whole Realme in a maner being againt her, & that be had brought this to palle for this lingular intent and purpole, that this Incalme being onerwhelmed with herelies, flee might reduce againe the same wato the true Catholicke faith. And where the toke the Lady Elizabeth into her fauour, and loved her fo tenderly, and alfo the Lord Courts ney, who of long time had bene determed in pailon, and by her was let at libertie, and received great benefites at her hands, and notwithstanding all this, they had conspired most binnaturally and traiterously against her with that haynous Braytour wiate, and by the confession of wyate (layde he) and theletters lent to and fro may playnely appeare: Verthere was some in the City of London, whiche reported that what was constrained by the Counsell to

my L. Maioz (quoth he) have not feene the fame punished. The party is heere, layd the Lord Maior. Take bym with you (laid Batoinet) and punish him according to his Belett, & faid further: My Lord, take heede to your charge the Citie of London is a whirlepole and fincke of all emil rumontes, there they be bread, and from thence spread into all partes of this ixealme.

There flood by the fame time the Lord Shandoys, who being then Lieutenaunt of the Tower, and now hearing the Bylhop thus speake, to southhis tale, came in with thele words as followers.

My Lordes (quoth be) this is a trueth that I thall tell you, I being Lieutenant of the Tower when wiat suffeed he delired me to bring him to the Lorde Courmey, whych when I had done, he fell down vpon his knees before him in my presence, and desired him to confesse the truth of hym felfe, as he had done before, and to submit himselfe buto the Queenes Maiellies mercy,

And thus much I thought of this matter to beclare, to the entent that the Reader perceiving the proceedings of
