S Anno Zour conflaunt continuance in the cheerefull confession of Bods enerthling veritic. For it is a true faying: If we be dead with him, we shall also live with him: If we be patient, we shall also raigne with him: If we deny him, he shall also deny vs. where= fore be we of good cheere, alwayes bearing about in our body the dying of the Lord Iesus, that the life of Iesus might appeare also in our body : For we know that he which raised up the Lorde lefus, shall rayse vp vs also by the meanes of lefus, and shall joyne vs to himselfe together with you. Wherefore we are not weeried: but though our outward man perish, yet the inwarde man is renuedday by day. For our tribulation, which is momentane and light, prepareth an exceeding and eternall weight of glory vnto vs; while we looke not on the things which are seene, but on the things which are not seene. For the things which are seene, are temporall; but the things which are not seene, are eternall.
we tellisie unto you, Reverend fathers, that we drawe

And Arruft we chall corinually with you bleffe the Lozd, a give thanks to the Lord out of the wels of Acraeli; we cruft to bee merry together at that greate Supper of the Lambe, whole fpoule we are by faith, and there to fing that long of euerlafting Haleluyah, Amen. GRace and comfort in Christ Jelu our oucly comfort, in all exercenc assaultes, Amen.

Fayne woulde this field make strange of that which the fpirit both embrace. Oh Lorde how loth is this lottering finggard to palle forth in Bobs pathe? It fantalieth for-lord much feare of fraybugs : and were it not for the force of faith which pulleth it forwarde by the reque of Bods most sweete promise, and of hope which pricketh on behinde, great aduenture there were of fainting by the way. But bielled, and enerlastingly bleffed be that heavenly father of ours, who in his Chrift, our lufficient Sautour, hath vouched lake to thine in our harrs, that he geneth us the light of the knowledge of the glory of God, in the face of Ichu Chrift: and having this treasure in our carthen bellels, that the excellencie of the power might be Bods, and not ource, we are [according to his good will] troubled on enery fide, yet are we not without shift : we are in pouerty, but yet not without that is sufficient: we suffer persecution, but are not forsaken therein : we are cast downe, neuertheles we perish not: we beare in the body the dying of the Lorde Iesus, that the life of lesus might also appeare in our body. De biddeth vs to call our care on him, and layth, that affuredly he carethfor vs. And what thoughfor a leason he doth luffer us to be turmoyled in the tronblous tempeltes of temptation, and feemeth as in much anger to have ge= uen vs ouer, and forgotten vs ? let not vs for all that leaue 1.Pet.s. off to put our truft in him, but let be with goody Job conclude in our sclues and say: Even though he kill mee, yet will I put my trust in him. Let us with the blessed Abzaham in hope, even contrary to hope by beliefe, leane buto that our louing Lozd, who though for our probation, be luffereth bs to be afflicted, pet will he not bee alwayes chiding, neither keepeth he his anger for euer : for he knoweth whereof wee bee made: he remembreth that we are but dust, wherefore, looke how high the heauen is in comparison of the earth, so great is his mercy towards them which feare him. Looke how wide the East is from the West, so farre hath he set our sinnes from vs. yea, like as a father pitieth his owne children, euen so is the Lorde mercifull vnto them that feare him. Dh what great cause of rejoycing have we in our most gracious Bod ? we can not but burft foozth into the prayling of fuche a bountifull be= nefactour, and lay with the lame plalmit : Prayle the Lord O my soule, and all that is within me prayse his holy name Praise the Lord O my soule, and forget not all his benefites.
