¶ An other Letter to Mayftres Lucy Harrington,

Gleace and mercy. Ac. It happeneth oftentimes that a-boundannee of matter bringing with it much vehemecy offrendly affection, maketh men dumbe; and even then chiefely when there is most eger purpose of speaking, lie lence doth inppielle, and cauleth the party lo affected, bus perfectly to expicile that he goeth about to better. Such impediment by much matter mingled with feruency of affection, feele I some times in my felle, letting the biteraunce either by tongue or writing, of the aboundance of the hart. The lone of our most gracious Bod and heavenly father bestowed byon be in the merites of Chail our Saujour, who may by coceipt of minde comprehend, palling in deed al understanding much less may the same by any meanes be expressed by writered. And as suche heavenive blessinges which by faith we fetch from aboue, be inexplicable: lo is it hard to biter, when the faythfull are fet on fire by loue, they readines to reach forth and to gene by charity, as by faith they have receined. But (alas) we cary this treasure in earthen reffels Sany times faith is selle, and then lone loforh her fernoz. Dray we therfore, Lord encreale our fayth, and lone forthwith will be on fire. And immortali thanks be genen unto our Bod, who in our Chaift hath bestowed byon vs the first truites of his spirite, who cryeth in our hartes Abba Father. and (as S. I thanke you for your great frendthyp and tender god will towards my wife: yea that god gra= cious Bod recompèce you, which may wortheir with the more counternayle the lame, and fulfill that which lacketh of thankefull duety in vs. And because of that which beretofoze I have conceived of you and of your moze then na= turall lone towardes me and mine: I make my felfe thus bold to lay this burde opon you, even the care and charge of my fayd pone wife I meane, to be onto her a mother & miltres to rule and direct her by your discreet counsell. I know the conceineth of you the fame that I do, & is thankfull buto Bod with me for such a frend; and therfore I be= feech you even for Christes lake, put never from you thys frendly charge oner her, whether I live longer of thettly depart. But to charge you otherwife, thankes be to Bod, neither I neither the haue any fuch extreme need:if we had I would be as bold with you as mine owne mother. ains a my good Lady, with thankes allo for my port wife and child, the Lord recompence them.

An other letter to his wife with a certayne remembraunce to M. Harrington and M. Hurland.

GRace and comfort &c. Wife you shall do best not to come of letter of M. Saunders to Saunders to your felfe in daunger where it needes not: you shall I think, short- his wyfe. ly come farre enough into danger by keeping fayth and a good conscience: which (deare w) I trust you do not slacke to make reckoning and account upon by exercising your inward man in meditation of Gods most holy word, being the sustenance of the foule, and also by gening your selfe to huble prayer for these two thinges be very meanes how to be made members of our Christ meet to inherite his kingdome.

Do this (deare wife)in earnest, and not leaving of and so we two shall with our Christ and all his chosen children, enjoye the mery world in that euerlasting immortality, wheras here will nothing els be found but extreme misery, euen of them which most greedely feeke this worldlye wealth: and fo, if we two continue Gods children graffed in our Chrift, the same Goddes blessing which we receive, shall also settle vpon our Samuel. Though wea do shortly depart hence and leave the poore Infant (to our seeming) at all aduentures, yet shall he have our gracious God to be his God: for so hath he sayd and he cannot lye: I will be thy God (fay th he) and the God of thy feed.
