Anno ? nerd, bring then Curate of the fayd Church (and is yet as I beare lay to this day) to stoppe the burial therof, rode to the bishop named Rante Bayne, to certify him of the matter, and to have his adule therein. In the meane time, the body lying there a whole daye, in the night time one Rich. Monce a Taplour woulde have enterred him. But then came John Thoglyne of weme with other moc, woulde not fuffer the body to be buryed: expediting to be frontrary examples of good Toby, for as he was religious in bu= riging the dead to this man putteth religio in not burying the dead: to that after he had layne there two dayes a one night, conuneth the forelayd Bernerd the Curate with the Bilhops letter, the contentes of which letter beying copied out word for word here followeth.

A copy of the Byshops Letter written to the Parish of Weme.

VNderstanding that one Glouer an heretick is dead in the va-Raufe Bayne B. rish of Weme, whiche Glouer hath for all the time of my being in this country bene knowne for a rebellion agaynst our ho. ly fath and Religion, a Contemner of the holy Sacramentes and ceremonies vsed in holy Churche, and hath separate himselse fro the holy Communion of all good Christian men, nor neuer required to be reconciled to our mother holy Church, nor in hys last dayes did not call for his ghostly father, but dyed without all rites belonging to a Christian man: I thought it good not only to commaund the Curate of Weme that he shoulde not be buried in Christian mans buriall, but also will and commaunde all the parish of Weme that no manne procure, helpe, nor speake to haue him buried in holy ground: but I do charge and commaund the Church Wardens of Weme in speciall, and all the parishe of the same that they assist the sayd Curate in defending and letting, and procuring that he bee not buried neither in the Churche nor within the wanybles of the Churchyarde, and likewise I charge those that brought the body to the place, to cary it away agayne, and that at theyr charge: as they will aunswere at theyr perill. By f vertue of this forciaid letter lo it fel out, that they which brought the corps thuber, were fague at their owne charges to carre it backe againe. But for so muche as the body was corrupted, and fineit fo frongly that brinceh a= my man might come nere it, they were forced to draw it is boiles onto a bromefield, and there was he buried.

M. Edward Burton not fuf. fered to be bueyed in Christian buriall, the time day when Q. Elizabeth was crowned.

The like example of charitable affection in these catholicke churchmen is also to be sene and noted in the burying of one maylice Edward Bourton Elquire, who in plaine Diocesic of Chester departing out of this worlde the verye day before Queene Blizabeth was crowned, required of his frendes, as they would aunswere for it, that his bodye Charle be buryed in his Parithe Churche (which was so Chaddes in Shroulbury) to that no Mallemonger Choulb be prefent therat. which thing being declared to the Lurat ofithat parity named fir John Marthal, a the body being withall brought to the buriall, upon the fame day whe the Queene was crowned, the Lurate being therwith offenbed, layd playnely that he thould not be buried in y church there. Whereunto one of his frendes, named Beorge # 02= pelley answering againesaid, that Bod would judge him in the last day. ac. Then the priest, Judge Bod (laith he) or Denil, the body thall not come there. And to they burged him in his owne garden. where he is no doubt as neare kingdome of beauen, as if he had bene buried the middelt of the Church.

Moreover, in the layd County of Salop, I finde that one Diquer Richardyne of the Parifhof whitchurch was burned in Bartford welle, Syr John ygone being She= riffe the same time. whiche seemeth to be about the latter yearc of king Benry vin. whole name becaule it was not mentioned befoze, Ithought here to geue some little touch of him, having now in hande to speake of the perfecution within the Diocelle of Couentry and Liechfield.

The Martyrdome of William Wolfey, and Robert Pygot Paynter.

A fret the inffereng of Maylier Robert Bloner & Coj= nelius Bongey at Couentrye, followeth next the con= Demuation of other two blelled Marryis which were ind-

ged and condemned at Bley by John Kuller the Billions Chauncellour of Bley, Doctor Sharton bis Suffragane, Robert Steward Deane of Eley, John Chaftopherion Deane of Morwich. &c. an. 1555. October 9. the names of which marry is were william wolley and Robert Pygor, dwelling both in the Towns of wilvich, whiche william wolley being a constable, owelling and inhabiting in the Bowne of well, was there brought to death by the meanes and procurement of one Richard Guerard Bentlema Richard E= a Julice appoyated to those dayes, who extremely handico the fame william wolley, and bounde him to the god abcaring, cauting him to put in furctics upon his and behautor virill the next general Selfions holden within the Ale of Elegiand to the layd wolley being dispatched of his office, and brought in trouble, remoued his home & dwelling place, comming to dwell in the Towns of wilbiche. Then being called agayne at the nexte Sellions, hee was fill constrayned to put in new surcres, which at the legth be refused to do, a so was commaunded to the Jayle, at the Syle holden at Bley in lent.

In the Balter wecke folowing, there repayled to conferre with him, D. Faller the Chauncellog, with Christopherson, and one D. Young: who laybe carnefly to hys charge that he was out of the eatholicke fayth, willing him to meddle no further with the feriptures, the it did become fuch a lay man as he was, to do. The faid william wolfey flading ftill a great while, fuffering them to fay their pleafures, at the laft answered in this wile: Bod in. Doctor, what did our Sautour Chill meane, when he spake these wordes written in the 13. Chapter of S. Mathewes Bofpcil:Wo be vnto you Scribes and Pharifeis, ye hipocrites for ye that up the kingdome of heaven before men; ye your felues goe not in, neither suffer ye them that come to enter in.

Yea fayeth Doctour Fuller, you must buderstand, that

Chilf fpake to the Scribes and Pharileys. Pay Maylier Doctour (lagth wolley) Chilf fpake e= ue to you, and your felowes here prefent, a to at other fuch like as you be.

Away Mayster Doctor (saith Christopherson) for you can do no god with this man, yet fayth D. fuller, I will leane thee a boke to read. I promise thee, of a learned mas doing, that is to lay of Doctor watlons doing, (who was then Billiop of Lincolne.)

wolley receiving the lame bothe, did diligently reade D. Warlons it ouce, which in many places did manifeltly appeare contrary to the knowne trueth of Bods word. At the length a fourtnight of three weekes folowing, the laybe Doctone fuller reforting agains to the prison bouse to confer with the sayd wolsey, did aske him how be liked the sayd boke (thinking that he had won him by y reading of the fame:) who aunswered him and sayd: Syz, I like the boke no otherwise then I thought before I thould find it. wherup on the Chauncellog taking his boke departed home.

At night when D. Fuller came to his chamber to loke on it, he did finde in many places cotrary to his minde, the booke raced with a pen by the layd wolley. The which hee feing, and being vered therwith, layd: Oh this is an obliv nate bereticke and bath quite marred my boke.

Then the Syle holden at wishich drawing nye, Docto, Julier commeth agayne to the layd wolley, and speas keth buto him on this maner: Thou doell much trouble The Chanmy colcience, wherefore I pray thee depart, & rule thy toug, to that I beare no more complaint of thee, and come to the Church when thou wilt, and if thou be complayned bpon, fo farre as I may, I promile thee I will not heare of it.

Then being broughte to the Sellions before named, wolley was layd in the Caftle at wilbich, thinking to him and al his fredes, that he Chould have luffered there at that present time, but it proued nothing so.

Then Robert Pygot the painter bring at liberty, was there presented by some entil disposed persons (sworne me as they called them) for not comming to the Church.

The layd Pygor being called in the Sellions, woulde notablent hunselfe, but there bid playnely appeare before Syl Clement Bygham being Judge, who layd buto him: Ab are you the holy father the paymer ? Bow chaunce ye came not to the Churche: Syr (quoth the Paynter) Jam not out of the Church, I truft in Bod.

Mo Syr, layd the Judge, this is no Churche, this is a Baule. Ye lir layd 194gor, I know very wel it is a Baule: but he that is in the true faithfof Iclus Chrift, is neuer ab-

lent, but prefent in the Church of Bod.

Ab Sytha, layd the Judge, you are to high learned for Rob. Pigot me to talke with all: wherfore I will lend you to them that brought to be better learned then I, Arayght wayes commanndyinge the layle him to the Jayle where wolley lay, so the sellios being where W. byoken Wolfey lay.
