This Tomas Browne being had to fulha, withe other thereto be examined, was required upon Thuriday, being perui. Day of Septems ber, to come into the Chappell to heare Walks, whiche he refuling to doc, went into the warren, and there kneled among the trees. For this hee was greatly charged of the Bilhop, as for an haynous matter, because he fand it was done in deluite and contempt of they, maile: which feemed to the Bylion and his Chaplaynes no fmall offence. At length being producted to his lateramination before the layd Bilhop, rv. day of Januarye, there to heare the len= conce diffinitive agaynst hira, first bee was required wyth many fayte wordes are gloling promifes to renoke hys bottrine, to whome the forelayo tophoppe fpeaking thefe woordes, sayde: Browne, ve haue bene besoze me ma= ny tymes and ofce, and I have travailed with thee, to wynne thee from thone erroures: yet thou and suche like have and doe reporte that I goe about to seeke thy

To whome the layd Thomas Browne aunswered a= gayreryca my Lord (fayo be) in deede ye be a bloudfucker e I would I had as much bloud, as is water in the Sea, for you to lucke.

Boner then proceeding to the articles, when he hadde red them onto him agayne, as he had done diners tymes before, after him whether he was content and willing to relinquithe those bys berefies and erroncous opinions (as he called them) and returne agayne but othe buitte of the catholicke fagth. whereunto he made auns were again laying, if they were herelies, he would feclake them. They be herefies (quoth the Bythoppe.) Bowe will be proue it, land Brownestor I will not goefro mine auniweres, crcept you ca proue them to be herefies, which ye that never Do. For that whiche you call berefic, is no berefie. with that Boner not able, or els not disposed to supply the park of a sufficient teacher, in proning that which the other had denyed by good authoritic and doctrine of the scripture went about with wordes and promife of pardon, to alfure him to renounce those his herefies, as he called them and to returne buto the buitte of his mother the Catholicke Churche. ac.

Lowdom the layd Thomas inferred agayne, as followeth: Poone it (layd he) to be herefie, that I do hold and mayntayne, and I will turne to you. But you condemne enc, because I wil not confesse and belene the bread and in the facrament of the aultar (as you call it to be the body of Chill, and therfoze ye spill myne and such like innocents bloud, being the Queenes true subjectes, for whiche you thatt auniwere, and that though.

After this being spoken, Boner as hee had done to the other before, read in writing the fentence diffinitive agaynt him. The copie and forme of which fentence wher= with the Papilles were wont to condemne all the innocent laynes of Chriftes, is above expressed, pag. 1417. And le this donc he was committed to the Sheriffes to be had away, and burned the prouiday of the fayd moneth of Ja= muary, constantly abiding with the other, the Popes toj= mentes for the crue contellion of his Christian fayth.

4. Iohn Tudfon Martyr.

The same daye and tyme, when the foresayde John Browne, with his fellowes was condemned (as is a= bone rehearled) being therb, day of Januarye was also producted John Andlon with the rest of the layde company, vuco the like condemnation. This John Tudion was borne in Iplwich in the Country of Suffolke, after that apprentife in London, dwelling with one Beorge Bood= yeare of the parishe of saynct Mary Botulphe, within the diaces of London, who being complayned of to Sir Ris chard Cholmicy and Doct. Story, was by them fent buto Boner bilhop of London, and was diners tymes befoze bim in cramination.

The Articles and interrogatories ministred buto hym, as buto the reft, before are specified, with hys aunfweres also to the same annexed. Ac. After this hee was brought buto the open Coulinory; where the layd bleffed and true fernaunt of the Lord John Tudion, appearing before the layde bythoppe and his complices, was moned with fundry perswalions (as they maner is) to goe from his opinion (which they named bereste) and to persiste in the builtie of the Churche which they were of, but hee constaily persisting in that which he had received by the preachers in king Edwardes tyme, refused to to doe, faying there was no berefie in his answeres. For I (layo be) defo all berefie. The Bythop yet fill bled his olde accustomed perswasions to remoue him, promising moreover all hys offences and erroures (as he called them) to bee forgenen bym, if he would returne. ac. Then fagde Tudion: Tell me wherein I have offended, and I will returne. Then fayd the Bylhop: In your auniweres. No, fayd Tudion agavne, 3 have not therein offended; and ye, my Lord pre= tend Charitie, but nothing therofappeareth in your woz-kes. Thus after a few wordes y bullop did likewife promulgate agaynft hym fentence of condemnation, whiche Sentence being red, the godly and confrant marry, was committed read against to the fecular power, and so with much pacience finished this life with the other about named, the proif. daye of January.

And when the Bilhop yet not with standing did ftill vige and call vpon him with words and fagze gloles, Tohn Went to gene oner himfelfe to they, opinion, he could have no other answer of hym but this: Ao, I say as I have say & cc. whereumpon being condemned by the Bishops sentence, perswasios, he was committed unto the Sheristes (whom that thame- Ich Went les shaucling at y time abused so, hys service Butchers) codemned. and to brought to hys martyrdome, which he with no lette constancie suffered to the ende with the rest of that biested focietic of Mariyis abone named.
