This Diation of M. Bales beyng premiled, now let be profecute, the Lord willing, that which we promiled, concerning the Disputation of Conference had at wellminiter. The copy whereof here followeth.

The Conference or Disceptation had and begun at Westminster, the last of

March, vpon certaine Questions or Articles of Religion proposed, and also of the breaking up of the same, by the Papistes default, at the first beginning of Queene ELIZABETH.



D it pleased the Queenes molt excellent ma-D it preated the Aucenes mon execution ma-icitie, hanging heard of directitie of opinions mectraine matters of religion among it fun-boy of her longing finitets, and being very believing to have the fame reduced to fome

godly and whittian concord, by the aduite of the Lordes and others of the pring Countaile, as well for the latifaction of perions boubtfull, as allo for the knowledge of the very truth in certains marters of difference, to have a connement chofen number of the beft learned of cyther part, and to conferre together their opinions and reasons, and thereby to come to fome good and charitable agreement. And hercuppon by her Maichies commambement, cer= Came of her piny Countaile declared this purpose to the Archvillioppe of Porke (beging also one of the fame pring Countaile) and required him that he would imparte the fame to fome of the Billiops, and to make choile of viil.ir. or r. of them, and that there thould be the like number na= medofthe other part. And turther also declared to bym (as then was supposed) what the matter should be. And as for the tyme, it was thought meet to be as fone as pol= lible might be agreed byon. And then after tertaine dayes paff, it was figuified by the fand Archbilhoppe, that there was appointed by fuch of the Bilhops, to whome bee had imparted this matter eight persons, that is to lay, 4. Bi-flops and 4. Doctours. The names of whom here follow under written, et.

who were content at the Queenes Maiellies com= manndement, to thewe their opinions, and as the layde Archbilhop termed it, render accompte of their fayth in those matters which were mentioned and that especially in writing, although he faed, they thought the fane fo Determined, as there was no cante to dispute uppon them. The matter which they floud talke upon, was compicbended in thefe three propositions, here wider fpetitied.

It is agaynst the worde of God, and the custome of the auncient Church, to vse a tongue unknowen to the people, in common prayer, and the administration of the Sacraments.

(Euery Church hath authoritie to appointe, take away, and change ceremonies and Ecclefiasticall rites, so the same be to edification.

It cannot be prooued by the worde of God, that there is in the Masse offered up a sacrifice prepitiatorie for the quicke and the dead.

He was beceupon fully refolued by the Queenes ma= feffie, with the abuile aforelayd, that according to their be= fire, it foould be in writing on both partes, for anoyding of much alteration in wordes, and that the fayd Bilhops Could, because they were in authoritie of degree superis ours, first beclare their myndes and opinions to the mats ter, with their reasons in waityng. And the other number beying allo big, men of good degree in schooles, and some

hauping bene in diguitic in the church of England, if they had any thing to fay to p contrary, flould the fame day be-tlare their opinions in lyke manner, and to ease of them thouse definer their writings to the other, to bee confide= red what were to bee impromed therein, and the fame to declare agaque in writing at fome other connenient day, and the like order to bee kept in all the reft of the matters. All this was fully agreed upon with the Archv. of yorke, and to alfolignified to both parties.

And immediately berempon, diners of the Bobilitie and flaces of the realine binderflanding that inch a meting and conference fhoulde bee, and that in certaine matters whereupon the Courte of Parliament confequently following fome lawes might be grounded. They made ernell meanes to her Maielie, that the parties of this conference, might put and read their affertions in the English tougue, and that in the prefence of them of the Bouiliere and others of her Parliament house, for the better fatisfiacs tion and enabling of their owne indgements, to treat and conclude of fuch lawes as unght depend hereupon.

This allo beying thought very realonable, was lightfied to both parties and fo fully agreed byon, and the daye appoyuted for the fielt meetyng, to bee the friday in the forenone, being the last of Barch, at wellminiter church. At which forclayd day and place, both tor good order & tor honour of the conference by the Queenes maielies come mandement, the Lordes and others of the pring countaile were prefent, and a great parte of the nobilitie also: And norwithflanding this former order appoynted, and confented unto by both partes, yet the Billion of wincheffer e his Colleagues alle bging they bad millaken ytheir als fertions and reasons thould be written, and so onely recited out of the bothe, fayd their bothe was not reavy then written, but they were ready to argue and bilpute, and therefore they would for that tyme repeate in fpeache that which they had to fay to the first probation.

This partation from the former order, and specially from that which themselves had by the sayde Archbishop in writing before required, adding thereto the reason of the Apostic, that to contend with wordes, is profitable to nothing, but to induction of the hearer, feemed to the Queenes maieffics counfaile fomewhat Grange, and pet was it permitted without any great repichenfion, becaule they exended themselves with miliationg the eider, and agreed that they would not faile but put if in writing and according to the former order, beliuer it to the other part, and to the fayo Billyop of wincheffer and bys Lol-leagues, appoynted Doctour Cole Deane of Paules, to be the vecerer of their myndes, was partly by iperch ones ly, and partly by readying of authorities written, and at certaine tyines beyng enformed of his Colleagues, what to fay made a declaration of their meanynges and their reasons to their field proposition, which being ended, they were affied by the pring Counfaile if any ofthem bab any more to be fayd, and they fayd no. So as the other parce was licenced to thewetheir inundes, which they byd accordying to the fielt order, exhibitying all that whiche they ment to be propounded, in a boike witten, which after a prayer and impocation made most humbly to almighive Bod for the enduring of them with his holy fpirite, and a protestation also to fand to the bottrine of the Catholike Church builded upon the Seriptures, and the doctrine of the Prophets and the Apollies, was diffmerly red by one Robert Borne Bacheler in Dimmitte, late Drane of Durefine, and after Bilhoppe of wincheller. The Copps of which their Proteflation here followeth, accordying as to was by him penned and exhibited, with their preface alfa before the fame, as is here expresed.

Forasmuch as it is thought good vnto the Queenes most excellent Maiesty (voto whom in the Lord all obedience is due) that we should declare our indgement in writing vpon certaine propositions : we, as becommeth vs to doe herein, moit gladly

Seeving that Christ is our onely mailter, whome the father hath commaunded vs to heare: and feyng also hys worde is the truth, from the which it is not lawfull for vs to depart not one haire bredth, and against the which (as the Apostle faith) we can do nothing, we doe in all thinges submitte our selues voto this truth, and doe protest that we will affirme nothing agrand the

And forasmuch as we have for our mother the true and catholike Church of Christ, which is grounded upon the doctrine of the Apostles and Prophetes, and is of Christ the head in all things gouerned, we do renerence her judgement, we obey her authoritie as becommeth children; and we do denoutly profeste and in all points follow the faith which is conteined in the three Creedes, that is to by, of the Apostles, of the Councell of Nice.
